FBI Fights Subversive Elements Agree Four YMCA Debaters

There are subversive elements in the United States, and the Federal Bureau of Investigation is doing a good job combatting them, four YMCA Little Town Hall debaters agreed Thursday—but thereafter they divided sharply.

“Subversive elements in America: are we hunting witches or facing a serious threat?” was the topic of discussion at the Thursday night meeting of the group held at the First Congregational Church.

Speakers were John W. Pennington, city attorney; Marvin T. Warlick, head of the Warlick Lumber Co.; H. V. Johnson, attorney; and Charles G. Howard, professor of law at the University of Oregon.

Mr. Warlick and Mr. Howard expressed the opinion that the FBI and the Federal Grand Jury are handling the investigation of such elements adequately. They believe that such things as loyalty oaths and congressional committees are hindering rather than helping the cause by raising unnecessary furors.

“Don’t burn the house down to get the rat,” Mr. Howard said in summing up his point of view.

The opposition, Mr. Pennington and Mr. Johnson, believed that investigating committees are fundamental necessities of federal, state, and local government and that no loyal American should be ashamed or afraid to sign a loyalty oath.

Robert D. Clark, forum moderator, presided over a discussion and question period which followed the debate.

Solo Program Set Tomorrow
