Exuberant Emeraldite Elucidates Extensive Election Explanation

Don't be confused! We have here a simple elemental explanation of the preferential voting system which will be used again this year.

This type of voting system is designed for elections where there are more candidates than offices, to better represent the opinion of the voters.

Basically, it works like this: candidates are voted for in the order of the voters' preference. There are four ASUO council offices vacant with five candidates running for them this year at the University. Candidates may be voted for, irregardless of any affiliation, in any order. There will be no "lost" votes.

In other words, though Joe Schmoe may be running on the Western party ticket as a number two candidate he can win the election. And similarly, if Bessie Blatz is running for number three on the Eastern Party ticket and "Lucky" Lager is running for number one on the Western Party ticket, if the votes fall differently than as provided on the party slate, Lager could get one with Bessie two.

When a candidate for the num-

ber one position has reached his quota of votes, the first place votes for the other candidates count in determining the winner of number two position. When the number two position has been discovered, the number one and two votes of the three remaining are counted in determining the number three officer and then the number one, two, and three votes are added with the number four votes in determining the winner of number four position. The final losing candidate is presented with the condolences of his friends. This same system is applicable to the class elections.
