Libe Addition Usage Delayed

Usage of the Library addition has been delayed by circumstances beyond control, according to Carl W. Hintz, Librarian. The delay has been caused by the failure of contractors to complete the building by the date expected and by the non-arrival of certain items of equipment as scheduled.

Until such time as usage is effected the Library will continue to follow present organization and operation.

One change will become effective immediately, however. Students will be able to select their own books from materials in the Reserve Room as all books on reserve will be arranged on open shelves according to the course for which they are assigned.

Students will pick up their own books, sign the card, and present card, book, and student fee receipt to the checker for charging. No library cards will be issued students but current fee receipts must be shown to draw books. Checkers have been instructed to examine all books taken out of the room.

Students will speed up the checking process by leaving their own books in the space provided at the entrance before entering the room. No study space is provided in the room where the reserve books are shelved but, with the former Browsing Room now available for study purposes, two large study rooms are within easy reach.

The new set-up has been planned to provide speedier service to students and, at the same time, to allow greater opportunity for selecting the most appropriate book by direct examination.

Simple Plan For Meetings

Want to hold a meeting in a University building?

Then you'd better check with Mrs. Gene Bailey in the Student Union building, administrative offices on mezzanine floor.

Mrs. Bailey will be handling room reservations for all University groups. And if there is no reservation—then there is no meeting, and no notification of the meeting on the student union calendar.

Under the new system set up this year, any group wishing a meeting in any campus building may see Mrs. Bailey in the afternoon hours. Reservations may be made no sooner than two weeks in advance of the meeting, and no later than 5 p. m. the day before the meeting.

Once reserved, the room will be ready and waiting for the group at the desired time—no fuss, no muss, and no finding out at the last minute that the room is locked.

In addition, the meeting will be on the all-University calendar, so interested persons can check the calendar to reassure themselves of dates and places.

Mrs. Bailey emphasizes two things:

1) All groups wishing to meet in any building, whether it be the music school, Gerlinger hall, or University Theater, must make the reservation through her office.

2) All reservations must be made in the afternoon.
