Ezzard Charles pounded out a unanimous 15 round decision over new champion, perhaps he will Joe Louis Wednesday night in a championship bout at Yankee Sta-

Charles, previously recognized as champion in 47 states, proved his mettle before New York state's doubting Thomases, by pulling out 12-3, 13-2, and 105 verdicts from the officials.

During his professional ring career Louis fought 61 bouts, previous to last night, winning 52 by knockouts, 8 by decision, and losing only 1, that by a knockout.

No more can we turn to the sports section to read about the smashing fists of Joe Louis, who pulverized his way across the athletic heavens of a nation and a planet as a bolt of lightning rips and snorts through black clouds. Joe Louis is not just a man-he is


