

Oregana to Take Photos of Men Starting Tuesday

Campus men will begin having their pictures taken for the 1951 Oregana Tuesday, with schedules due for distribution in living organizations from five to seven days before picture dates.

Students will sign two schedules: one for Kennell-Ellis, photographic studio, and the other for reference in the living organization.

Men's pictures will be taken first in order to enable them to start beard-growing when the call comes out for Sophomore Whiskerino, Editor Ruth Landry explained.

Women's pictures will be taken when the men's list is completed.

Men must wear suit jackets, shirts, and ties, with bow ties vetoed. Women's houses will be photographed in one of two combinations: dark jacket with white sweater or white jacket with dark sweater.

Retakes and missed appointments may be made up on Saturday mornings.

Intensive Orientation Program Helps Freshman Women Adjust to College

Freshman women at the University are in the midst of a planned orientation and counseling program which is designed to correct satisfactorily any problems which newcomers may have during their first term of campus life.

According to Mrs. Genevieve Turnipseed who heads the intensive study and activities service, the program will enable the girls to avoid many of the pitfalls that confront anyone enrolling at the University for the first time.

Details for the program were worked out during the spring term with questionnaires being sent out to all prospective students before the start of school. These questionnaires concerned the girls' activities, special talents, church affiliation, and interests in academic subjects. Each freshman was also asked to send a personal photograph with the other pertinent data to the University before fall term began.

The girls were officially inducted into the educational and counseling program on their arrival at the University. Newcomers were greeted by hall officers and members of Kwama, Phi Theta Upsilon and A. W. S. who attempted to bring a note of friendship and cheer into the hectic first day.

During the afternoon, A. W. S. conducted the women on a tour of the campus while in the evening, mixers were held to allow the freshmen to become better acquainted.

Special Programs

In addition to the all-campus activities during Freshman Week, the girls also attended style shows, talent assemblies, and pajama parties which were given to help orientate them to campus social life.

Following general orientation week and after class hours had been determined, the women met in groups to discuss their study programs and devise methods of effectively budgeting their time. Student counselors formulated the discussion and helped arrange individual programs.

AWS Week

Next on the tentative schedule for the girls is an AWS sponsored activities week during which the new students will learn more about campus extracurricular affairs—what they are, how to take part in them, and how to derive benefits from participation and membership in the organizations. Following introduction to campus activities, personal conferences with Mrs. Turnipseed will be held. She will attempt to help straighten out any academic or social problems that the girls may still have.

"The successful operation of the counseling and educational program up to this date," commented Mrs. Turnipseed, "is largely due to the excellent co-operation and admirable help of University student groups and leaders and with their continued support the program will remain a success."

Speech Correction Classes Scheduled

Hearing and speech corrections for children and adults by the University clinic will begin Saturday, Oct. 7 in Villard hall.

Services available include the testing of hearing, treatment of stuttering, re-education of cases with cleft-palates, delayed speech, hearing loss, speech defect due to nerve impairment, and speech-related psychological problems.

An adult group for those who stutter will be meeting every Monday evening from 7:30 to 9:30 p. m. at the clinic. They will be placed under a year-long treatment program.

Rehabilitation of the individual seeking aid, and supervised training and experience for advanced students specializing in the speech pathology field, is the two-fold purpose of the clinic.

Enrollment Fails To Show Fall-Off Officials Feared

The early fear of a large drop in enrollment, such as that being experienced at Oregon State College, appeared yesterday to be unwarranted, according to Registration figures.

The total number of students who are completely registered at the University has now risen to 4,826. However, the cash register total is 4,925 which means that a number of students have paid their fees but have not turned in their cards to the registrar's office.

Registrar Clifford L. Constance cautioned that students are not completely registered until all cards are in.

Taking the cash register totals as a basis, this year's figure is just 149 short of last year's total of 5,094. Figures from Oregon State College, reveal that the Corvallis school has suffered from a heavy drop in enrollment, a drop which was expected to hit Oregon.

Any girl who wishes to work for room and board should contact the student affairs office or the student employment service in the YWCA building. There are a number of jobs available.

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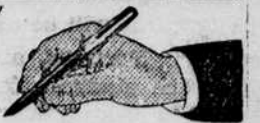
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
