

Pyongyang Object Of Two UN Forces

Two United Nations spearheads are racing toward the North Korean capital of Pyongyang today. It's a race between the United States First Cavalry division and the South Korean First division—supported by U. S. tanks.

Distance to the Red capital now is only about 40 miles in an air line. But it's about 60 miles over Korean roads. Tokyo military sources hinted yesterday that the Korean war may be drawing to a close—that the last major battle is close at hand—maybe.

Mopping-Up Operations...

... however, would take some time after all Communist organized resistance is ended. And the official shooting isn't over yet. Army sources say, however, that the Ko-Reds are crumbling, and the plunge toward Pyongyang in some places is becoming a footrace.

Russians Took A Beating...

... in the U. N. yesterday when the economic and social council rejected a Russ proposal that defeated North Korea be given a voice equal with South Korea in plans for rehabilitating the peninsula nation.

It looks now like a new UNRRA will come out of the council's debates and voting. An Australian proposal for setting up a seven-member fact finding board to study the Korean situation was approved yesterday. The board will look into the Korean situation first hand and see just what's needed.

Elections in Israel...

... will be forthcoming. Prime Minister David Ben-Gurion has reported he can't form a new cabinet. And in Israel, that means an election. His old cabinet resigned over the weekend. It's the first time a cabinet crisis has arisen in Israel since the tiny state was formed in May, 1948.

Testimony in the Seagraves...

... trial, in which the noted "Burma Surgeon" is charged with high treason against Burma, shows the American doctor's home was entered and damaged by Burmese troops. And a Burmese army officer also admitted that government soldiers assaulted Seagraves' servant.

Seagraves has pleaded innocent. Another Burmese official admitted that his troops beat rebels with rifle butts, but he didn't stop them because it was "not his duty."

Eisenhower Will Not Run...

... for president in 1952, the retired general says. Ike's statement came after Gov. Thomas E. Dewey said he favored Eisenhower as the Republican presidential candidate in 1952. "My future is with my job at Columbia University," says the former supreme allied commander of World War II.

But Ike said he was grateful and complimented by Dewey's support. Eisenhower has said many times before that we will have nothing to do with being president of the nation. Dewey's endorsement put powerful support behind him, however. And some political authorities considered Eisenhower's statement of refusal as guarded, and say the Columbia University president may still put his name before the GOP in '52.

Supreme Court Rulings...

... yesterday included a refusal to give Texas and Louisiana a new hearing on their cases contesting the right of the federal government to oil-rich lands under water along the coast of the two states.

The hick oil "bays" are now under lease to various private concerns by the states. The decision means that if the federal government wants to lease the lands, it can, and Texas and Louisiana can't do a thing about it.

Other Supreme Court rulings yesterday:

1—Agreed to consider an attack on the constitutionality of a California law which restricts recovery of damages in libel suits against newspapers and slander suits against radio stations. The law now permits substitution of a retraction statement for money damages.

2—Decided that motion pictures are not covered by the constitutional amendment assuring freedom of speech and freedom of the press. It means that cities can still ban motion pictures if they wish.

Parcel Post Rates Will Climb...

... as much as nine cents a pound, depending on the zone, if the Interstate Commerce Commission approves a request by Postmaster General Donaldson. Donaldson is using a little-known law which says he can take his rate-raise requests to the ICC if Congress refuses to approve them. It did and he has.

Donaldson has asked for raises of from four to nine cents for the first pound, and additional poundage increases of a fraction of a cent to three cents a pound.

Tacoma's New Narrows Bridge...

... saw a rush over the weekend which still has toll-takers and state patrolmen limp. The rush to cross the new span, dedicated Saturday, created a traffic jam for more than five miles from each end of the bridge.

During the real rush of the jam, attendants didn't even bother to take 15 cents from each foot-cropper... too many cars. In fact, about 10,000 cars, according to the Washington state patrol.

Deer Hunting in Oregon...

... has been extended through Oct. 22 by the state game commission. The season was originally scheduled to end today. A "hunters choice" season for Oct. 21 and 22 has been cancelled. Decision for the extended season was made late yesterday.
