

Frosh-Reserve Game Features Running Attack

The University of Oregon varsity reserves demonstrated a powerful ground offensive when they scrimmaged with the Oregon Frosh on a wet field Monday afternoon.

Coach Jim Aiken's varsity grid-ders gained 20 yards on their first play of the scrimmage and continued to make large gains on the ground throughout the contest. The Frosh runners, who averaged a phenomenal five yards per try in Friday's tilt with the Willamette Jayvees, were effectively stopped by the varsity forward wall.

Scoring Play

The only score of the scrimmage took place when the Varsity, paced by Quarterback Hal Dunham, Halfbacks Don Sloan and Carl Ervin, and Fullback Ron Lyman, drove about 81 yards to a touchdown on 14 consecutive running plays. The drive was almost halted when the Frosh stalemated two plays at the line of scrimmage, but the following play, a pitchout and run around right end, netted 15 yards. The same play was employed a few moments later for a 13-yard touchdown dash around right end.

Frosh Pass Defense Good

An improved Frosh pass defense held the Varsity to one completion, a 10-yard aerial to Dick Salter, in five attempts. Another pass play backfired when Frosh Right Tackle Darold Farr broke through the "iron pocket" and dropped the passer for a 15-yard loss.

Outstanding Frosh

Among the outstanding players for the Ducklings, who will battle the Oregon State Rooks Friday afternoon at Corvallis, were Left Half Jack Morris, Left Guard Howard Allman, and Fullback Bob Krasneski.

Linebacker What Am!

Dick Daugherty, varsity end and linebacker, is a fine football player in anybody's league. At 6 ft. and 205 pounds, he rates as one of the most versatile men on the Oregon roster. He tackles with a vicious authority that bespeaks sheer love of rugged body contact. He blocks in brilliant manner, and snags passes well, especially short ones. Last season as a sophomore linebacker, Dick logged 283 minutes of defensive action, and won honorable mention for All-Coast honors. Typical of the universal respect accorded him and equally rugged Dick Patrick was Pappy Waldorf's comment after the recent Cal game: "Yes, Daugherty and Patrick were tough today, but aren't they always tough?"

Ohio's His Home

Mr. Daugherty came to Oregon from Steubenville, Ohio high school where he starred at fullback for four seasons. It was not until his second year at Oregon that he was shifted to end linebacker, and he had never played end until spring practice this year. Whatever job he holds down next year, Dick seems sure to carve a large niche for himself in the Webfoot gridiron hall of fame.

A football player always likes to talk shop, and Dick has this to say concerning the relative merits of Pacific Coast and Big Ten teams: "People think that the Coast Conference isn't on a par with the Big Ten. Take it from me—Cal and UCLA and Stanford are right up there with the top 10 teams in the nation. That's competition."

UCLA vs. Cal.?

Dick also thinks the UCLA Bruins are a better ball club this year than Pappy Waldorf's Califor-

nia Bears. He said his best single football performance was fashioned against these Bruins in last year's spintangling 27-35 loss to UCLA.

This interview took place in Mac Court after football practice, and right then big Gus Knickrehm and Ray Lung, appeared, two former victims of this interview series.

They both had sly grins on their faces and they said: "Don't you forget Mike. Dick's got a dog he takes care of named Mike. Be sure and put that in the paper!"

High Total Pin Score

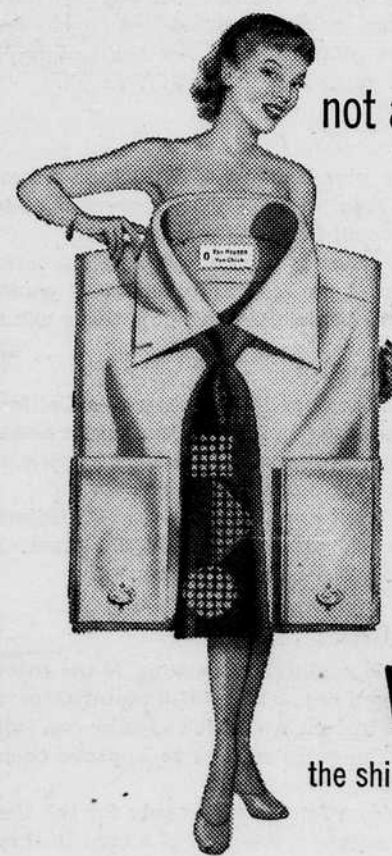
