Basketball Team Sets Workouts

Oregon's basketball Webfoots go into their fourth day of practice in MacArthur Court today, and Coach John Warren says his 23 charges have good attitude and are hard workers.

Mainly designed for conditioning, the first practices will include only a half an hour of scrimmage, but Warren expects the players to show their individual talents as well as can be expected this early in the season.

Missing from the workouts is Forward Will Urban, high pointer for the Duck's last season. Urban broke a bone in his foot earlier this fall. He should be able to commence getting back into shape by sometime in December.

"With Urban in the lineup," Warren said yesterday, "the squad will be strengthened. He'll need to get his legs into shape, of course."

Streeter Shifted

Mel Streeter, letterman who spent most of his time last season at the center position, has been shifted to a forward spot. Warren said he believes Streeter will be more valuable in that position.

Art Sheppard, transfer guard from Vanport, is picking up Warren-system fundamentals rapidly, and has looked good in the brief workouts so far.

Oregon's offense this year will again be the traditional fast break. Warren added that he will also use the alternating center offense.

In this system, men playing at each side of the basket in forward positions can slide into the key-hole and thereby "alternate" as offensive center. Streeter, Urban and other forwards may prove adept at this, Warren commented.

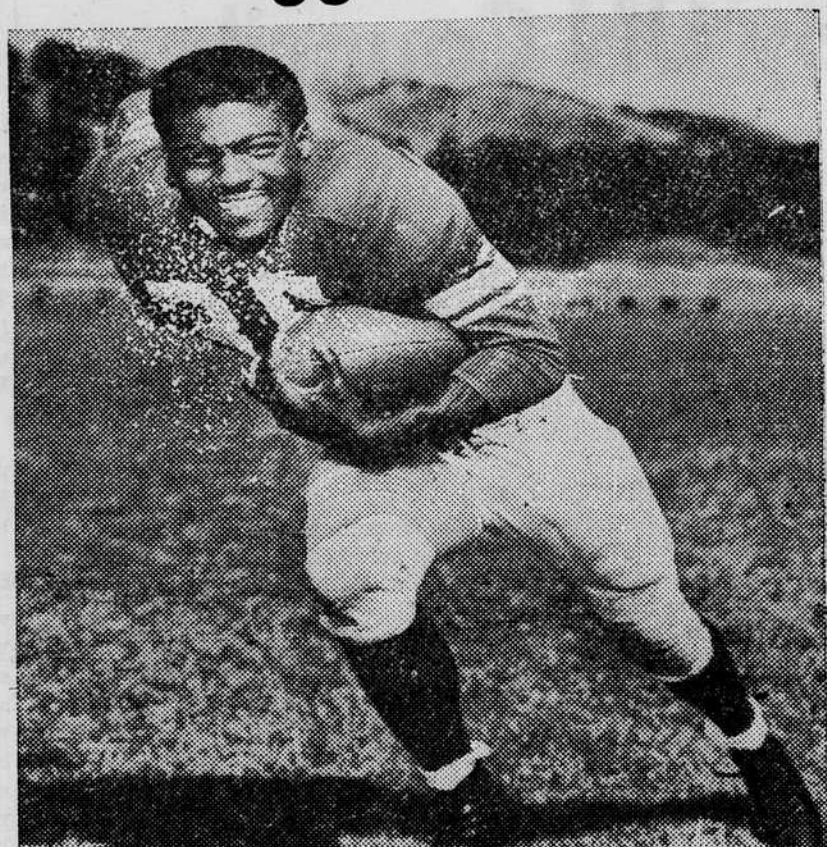

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Ducklings Set to Face OSC Rooks

University of Oregon's Frosh gridders will meet the Oregon State Rooks Friday afternoon at Corvallis.

It will be the first of two 1950 "Civil War" battles between the two squads. The second clash will take place at Hayward Field Saturday, November 18.

The Ducklings, boasting a lineup which includes eight veterans of the 1950 Portland Shrine game and many other former prep stars, defeated the Willamette Jayvees 32-6 at Eugene Friday. It was the second start of the season for the Willamette gridders, who were trounced 45-7 by the Oregon State Rooks in the opener for both teams the week before.

The Rooks seized an impressive 33-0 halftime lead by scoring two touchdowns during the first quarter and three more in the second period. Willamette failed to score until the third stanza, when a touchdown pass was completed on a fake punt play.

The Baby Beavers are loaded with pigskin talent from all corners of the nation. The 114 candidates who reported for the opening practice last fall included 18 veterans of the afore-mentioned Shrine battle in Portland.

The Shrine vets include ten Portland lads—Kaye Booth and Don Ford of Franklin high; Dean

Pochert and Stan Hays, Grant; Dale Brethauer, Jefferson; Dwane Helbig, Claret Taylor, Cliff York, and Jim Roberts of Roosevelt; and Bob Cassidy of Central Catholic.

Other Shriners on the Corvallis crew include Chuck Cody, Hood River; Jim Doerfler, Albany; Leo Parker, Medford; Chuck Brackett, La Grande; Keith Donahoo, Klamath Falls; Bob Hanauska, Mt. Angel; Bill Tubbs, Pendleton; and Gary Babcock, Corvallis.

Coach Hal Moe's Baby Beaver roster also includes Jack Petersen, an all-state halfback from Billings, Montana, and Dave Perrin, who was an all-cosmopolitan star in the New York City area.
