**Ashland**  
A generally quiet Halloween was held in Ashland, reportedly in part to the Junior-Senior Carnival held in the junior school.

Contributions to the Christmas tree decoration fund have still been coming in though a planned display was unable to be set up because of the weather.

**Bandon**  
The fourth annual Bandon Cranberry Festival was held last Friday and Saturday. Plans for it as announced in the Nov. 2 "Western World" included a Queen Coronation and Ball; the Cranberry Fair with exhibits of fresh, cooked, mixed and baked cranberries prepared in every shape and form by local housewives; a parade; the Cranberry Bowl football game between Bandon High and Coquille; and a Harvest dance at Tanglewood in the new resort ballroom.

**Carlton-Yamhill**  
The funeral of Peter C. Zimmerman, native of Yamhill, was held Tuesday. Zimmerman was living in state and local affairs, running for Governor of Oregon in 1934.

Mrs. Emanuel Linke's orchid with nine blossoms on it won the blue ribbon for the best species in the amateur class of the Oregon Orchid Society's show a week ago.

**Grants Pass**  
The Navy Band was scheduled to play in Grants Pass Saturday. Funds obtained from the band's appearance above expenses will be used by the merchants committee for a new city street Christmas decorations and the high school band and choir will get a percentage of their ticket sales to help purchase new uniforms and robes.

**Hillsboro**  
The fate of the proposed swimming pool for Hillsboro will depend on whether the federal government's ban on all amusement construction relates to this type project. City Manager J. W. Arney said that they were going to assume that the pool will be built until they are told differently as the plans and specifications are ready.

**Lebanon**  
Dick Lewis won first place in the state-wide essay contest sponsored by the Oregon Newspaper Publishers association and the Oregon Polystic Press.

A Denver, Colorado physician has high hope for Frankie Hand, 17-year old Lebanon victim of Leukemia, a disease for which there is no cure as yet. Frankie's parents are told by the doctor that his son who also has the disease is being kept alive by a rare and very expensive serum. It hasn't been decided whether Frankie will

be flown to Denver for treatment or receive it in Oregon.

**Myrtle Creek**  
Biggest news here, though it was news all over Oregon, was the weather. Myrtle Creek fell victim to a flood surpassing all others in the memory of the oldest residents. All communications were crippled, roads were blocked, power cut off and telephones disconnected, trains and buses did not run as roads and bridges were washed out, and water systems were knocked out. Only one death had been reported. One item missing that was not mourned over was the city dump which was completely washed away.

**North Bend-Coos Bay**  
A large cash prize is being offered to the high school that turns out the largest percentage of voters at the Nov. 7 election. The Get-Out-The-Vote contest is being sponsored by the Coos Bay Harbor and competing schools are Marshfield and North Bend high. Business men of the two cities are contributing \$5 each toward the prize and about \$300 had been collected by Wednesday of last week with more expected. There is considerable rivalry between the schools and all manner of plans were being used in working toward the goal of winning.

**Ontario**  
The new memorial to those who served in World War II was dedicated October 29. Joe Saito, a veteran of the war and regional official in the Japanese American Citizen's League, presented the memorial to the city of Ontario. Mrs. Hosada of Emmett, mother of three sons who served in the war, two of whom were killed, unveiled the monument and a floral wreath was placed on it by Mrs. Thomas Itami, sister of Jero Kanetomi, who died serving with the famous 442nd division.

**Willamina**  
The North Lincoln bank has received approval of the state banking board to establish a bank in Willamina and immediate steps are to be taken to open and operate the bank. Opening date is not to be later than February.

**Pallete to Explain Teacher Placement**  
The work of the teacher placement service in securing jobs for students going into teaching will be explained by Earl Pallete, director, at a meeting of all prospective teachers at 3 p.m., Nov. 14 in the University High School auditorium.
