Survey Finds UO Students Informed

What do you think of the present Korean situation? Is World War III imminent? What should our policy toward the Chinese Reds be?

These were the questions asked in a poll today designed to disclose student feeling concerning the war in Korea. The poll revealed that the campus is now much better informed upon U. N. and American action in Korea than a previous survey indicated.

Anne Britts—sophomore in music—"I don't think Russia is ready for a third World War. Without strong UN aid, we would have a hard time defeating the Chinese Reds."

Jean Scott—freshman in art—"I think that it looks pretty bad. It looks as though the Chinese Communists are going to take an active part in the Korean war. I don't believe that we should have crossed the 38th parallel, but merely liberated Southern Korea, at least for the time being. This is definitely the beginning of World War III."

Don Cobb—senior in history—"If we should become involved in a general Asiatic war then our position would be far worse than it was during World War II."

Stephen McCabe—freshman in political science—"I think that the present situation could very well develop into a third World War unless Communist China pulls out her divisions from the North Korean war. If they do not, I feel that UN forces should bomb the great power dams near the Manchurian border which supply power to both North Korea and China."

Shelby Walch—graduate student in psychology—"Since I am studying to take the Masters' oral exam in psychology, I haven't been able to keep up with the situation very well."

"I think that the situation will spread from Korea to China and will drag on there for at least another year-and-a-half, but I don't think that it will lead to a third World War as yet."

Virginia Wright—junior in sociology—"Whatever action is taken against the Chinese Reds should be proposed and carried out by the UN, not the United States alone. I don't think that Russia will enter the Korean War. She hopes to deplete our resources through war with her satellite nations."

Kathleen Benzel—freshman in pre-nursing—"I think that there will be another World War. If the Chinese Communists enter the Korean War, Russia will probably throw in with them."

Keith Schneider—senior in biology—"It's getting a lot worse than better, that's for sure. It looks like the World War III is about ready to cut loose. The Chinese Communists should be given an ultimatum—either keep out or take the consequences."

Barbara Jones—junior in speech—"I don't think that a third World War will materialize. I feel that if total war was to occur it would have appeared before this."

How this problem enters the life of some ordinary villagers and comes to a crisis in the experience of one family creates a situation full of suspense and conflict, Hunter explained.

Federal Job? Take Exams, Says Onthank

The easiest way to a career in the federal service for college graduates is to take the Junior Professional Assistant or Junior Management Assistant examinations, according to the graduate placement office.

Applications for the exams are available in the placement office, and must be turned in by next Tuesday.

The examinations are arranged to select qualified persons with preparation in a variety of academic fields. A number of agencies of the government have said they intend to employ successful candidates in the near future, so students passing the exam can look forward to specific employment possibilities.

Three agencies, the State department, Navy department, and Bureau of Reclamation, will select internes from among those who pass one or another of the exams. After the training period, these men and women will receive appropriate, responsible, professional, and executive assignments, the office said.

In addition, the Census Bureau, the Food and Drug Administration, Social Security Administration, Bonneville Power Administration, the Corps of Engineers and other agencies will employ those who pass the exams in various fields of work as junior professional or junior management assistants.

UO Landscape, Road, Sidewalk Near Completion


Landscape work on the extension of the east-west mall which traverses the campus between Kincaid and University Sts. is rapidly nearing completion.

I. I. Wright, superintendent of the physical plant, reported Tuesday that the east-west sidewalk will be poured Thursday, weather permitting. The remaining sidewalks included in the development will be black-topped soon.

Already completed, except for black-topping, is the service road which extends from University St. opposite the Student Union to a junction with the present entry road to Susan Campbell Hall and the Oriental Museum. The concrete sidewalks bordering the road were recently completed.

Black-topping of the road and the diagonal sidewalks will begin when weather and the contractor's schedule permit.

Four inches of rock base for the road and sidewalks have been prepared by the maintenance crew. Two inches of blacktop will finish the job.
