Box office for "Othello," Shakespearean tragedy directed by Otilie Seybolt, is open now in the University Theater. The play opens Friday and plays Saturday of this week, and Wednesday through Saturday of next week. Admission is \$1, or season ticket stub.

"Iago is contemptuous of all people," Wexler believes, "and has a high regard for his own brilliance. He enjoys running others' lives, merely for the sake of displaying his power over them."

Iago is the longest role in the tragedy, and Wexler considers the part a difficult one—both from the point of interpretation, and because of the demands of line memorization.

Wexler 'Old Hand'

But the senior is an old hand at acting, having played in many University Theater productions. He was seen last spring as General Kennion in "The Girl I Left Behind Me," and also was in the opener of the new theater, "Winterset," in which he played Esdras. Between those two shows, he had the comedy role of Hercules in "The Warrior's Husband."

His activities in speech extend into radio, where he has acted and announced, and will try his hand at directing later this year. He works now for KORE as a part-time announcer.

beer licenses in places near the campus were presented by Administrator William H. Hammond. The letters came from the Women's Christian Temperance union, the Gideons, the Oregon Council of Churches, and various organizations and individuals, mostly women.

There were fewer letters that rejected the proposed move. These came from Eugene businessmen and other individuals throughout the state.

Mountain Statement:

ASUO President Barry Mountain addressed a letter to the liquor commission in which he stated:

"The ASUO believes that a policy denying beer permits to nearby restaurants would be unwise if these establishments abide by all laws and regulations of the Oregon Liquor Control commission. Such a policy would merely encourage students 21 years and over to leave the campus area if they wished beer."

Hammond was instructed by Reed and Commission Chairman Carl Hogg to use the letters and any other sources to obtain views that would aid the commission in determining a policy.
