

# China Reds Mum On Korean Crises

The Chinese Communist delegation now present at the U. N. told the Security Council Monday that it was not at Lake Success to discuss the Korean problem. The announcement came from Wu Hsui-Chuan. He made it clear he had no intention of answering Gen. MacArthur's charges that 200,000 Chinese troops are now fighting U. N. forces. Wu said he was here to accuse the United States of aggression against Formosa and added that he intended to stick to this issue.

It has been announced that the Chinese Reds have close to 21 divisions on the Korean front, according to reports from commanders in that part of the country, and in comparison to this the U. N. command in Korea has seven full American divisions; six South Korean divisions, plus several other units smaller in size from other countries.

## Two Important Meetings...

... held Monday are expected to bring some sort of action against the "new war." One was held in Japan where Gen. MacArthur summoned his two top field commanders in Korea, Mag. Gen. Almond and Lt. Gen. Walton Walker. No announcement was made as to the outcome, and there was no statement from the second meeting with President Truman and his Security Council.

Members of his council are Vice President Barkley, Secretary of State Acheson, Secretary Marshall, and W. Stuart Symington, chairman of the National Security Resources Board.

## Many Senators...

... are expressing strong opinions on the next move by this country and the U. N. Senator Taft, (R-Ohio), the Republican policy chief, said Congress might have to remain on the job through Christmas. Senator Knowland (R-Calif.) said the United Nations should expel Russia and that U. N. air strikes against Red Manchurian bases should be launched immediately.

Senator Brewster (R-Me.) said he felt Gen. MacArthur should be given discretion to use the A-bomb if he desires, while Representative Cole (R-NY) said the time possibly has come to use it.

## English Officials...

... have expressed the opinion that Britain will oppose any moves to empower U. N. forces in Korea to strike against Chinese bases in Manchuria. The cabinet has not had a chance to study the situation which has arisen, but officials stressed it is British policy to avoid all actions which might involve U. N. forces in Korea in a war against Red China.

## On the Fighting Front...

... Red Chinese hordes are still crushing down on U. N. retreating troops. MacArthur's cosmopolitan Eighth Army of 110,000 battle-hardened troops was in retreat all along a flaming 75-mile front in Northwest Korea. The hardest fighting appeared to be in the Tokchon area where fierce communist assaults threw back three South Korean divisions as much as 20 miles.

## High Defense Officials...

... said Monday United Nations forces probably can hold a line against the Chinese masses in Korea as long as they have command of the air and sea, and ground troops possess greater firing power.

They also stressed the government view that the Chinese outburst in Korea constituted a "new aggression" which must be met by a decision in the United Nations. This might mean withdrawal of American troops to a specified line.

## The Government Will Build...

... a huge atomic energy layout in South Carolina to make materials for the awesome hydrogen bomb. In an announcement Monday of the site's selection, the AEC emphasized that the plants will not manufacture the bomb itself or any atomic weapons. It said they will "provide materials which can be used either for weapons or for fuels potentially useful for power purposes."

## The Stock Market...

... lost an estimated \$2,500,000,000 in listed values Monday in a selling wave inspired by the grave Korean crisis. Losses ran from \$1 to more than \$4 a share, and the overall fall was the heaviest since late in June when Americans were being pushed back by North Koreans at the outbreak of the war.

In other financial news, Secretary of the Treasury Snyder has estimated the government will spend \$45,000,000,000 and go \$2,000,000,000 in the red during this fiscal year.

## An All Time High...

... in the cost-of-living index is expected when the figure is announced today. It may increase by two or three cents the hourly pay rate for almost 1,000,000 workers covered by union contracts tied to the price barometer.

The index is computed monthly by the Bureau of Labor statistics. The new one will reflect the cost of things people were buying six weeks ago.

## Republican Leaders...

... expressed doubt Monday that an administration tax bill will get through this session of congress, but the House Ways and Means Committee drove ahead with preliminary work of drafting one.

After a GOP policy meeting, Senator Taft said the Senate group had decided against taking an immediate party stand now upon taxes, extension of rent controls, statehood for Hawaii and Alaska, or other bills on President Truman's must list for the short session.

## Disaster Chairmen

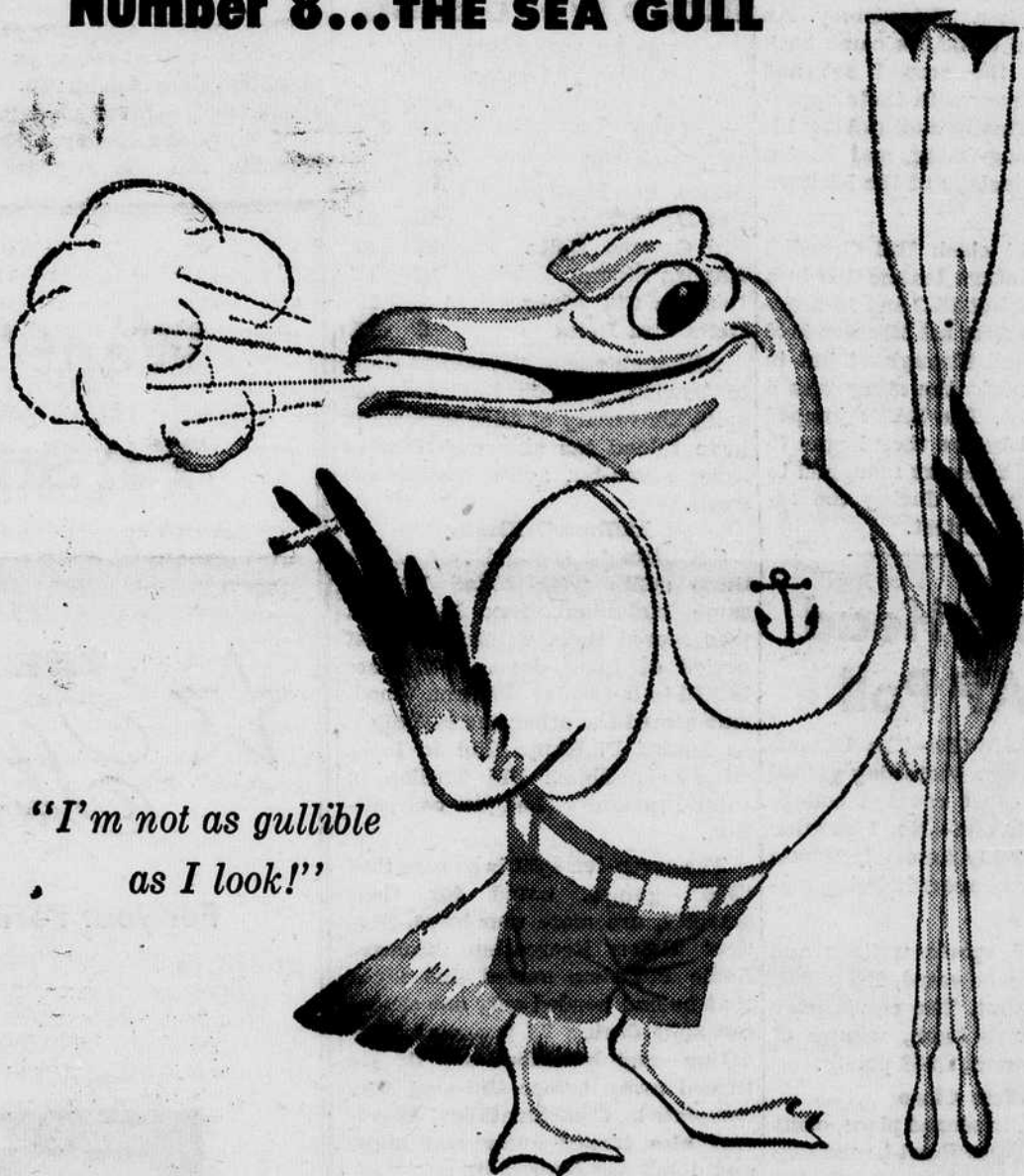
