

Minturn Hall Sweeps Both Volleyball Titles

Undefeated Dorm Squads Easily Rout Sigma Alpha Epsilon Crews

For those who know nothing else about intramurals with the exception of what they read in the newspapers, we make the following statement. There are many other organizations enrolled in sports in addition to Minturn Hall. This statement was made even a little more difficult to understand when both the "A" and "B" volleyball titles were won by the Minturns yesterday. This swells their total to three championships in as many attempts this year.

Sigma Alpha Epsilon was the runner up in both contests yesterday. They were trounced by Minturn 15-1 and 15-11 in the "A" struggle and 15-3 and 15-8 in the "B" game.

Minturn "As" Triumph

Starting off rapidly in the "A" tilt the boys from the Vets' Dorm poured on the coal and ended the first set with a 15-1 victory. An aroused band of SAE's came back strongly in the second set and nearly held even with their opponents before finally succumbing 15-11. Coley Pang-Ching, and Santos were the mainstays of the Minturn attack.

In the "B" clash Bill Crandall paced his Minturn teammates to a pair of drawn out 15-3 and 15-8 victories. In the first set Minturn held the upper hand throughout but in the second canto the story was a little different. The SAEs jumped to a 5-0 lead before they began to wear down. The losers managed to score three points during the remainder of the contest.

Sooners Head Final AP Poll

NEW YORK—(P)—The University of Oklahoma yesterday gained the nation's most coveted college football distinction—No. 1 position in the final weekly Associated Press Poll—and by an overwhelming majority.

Of the 319 sports writers and sportscasters who voted, 213 placed the Sooners first. The result gave Bud Wilkinson's team, winner of 30 straight games, 2,963 points.

Cadets Close

Only Army, in second place, came close to the Sugar Bowl-bound Oklahomans. The Cadets, undefeated through 28 games, received 38 first-place votes for 2,380 points. Ten points are given for a first-place vote, nine for second, and so on.

Notre Dame, No. 1 in three of the four previous years, was formerly selected almost unanimously to finish on top. The Irish, however, had one of their poorest campaigns, losing three games and tying one. As a result, they failed the finish among the first 29 teams.
