Students Show Disapproval Of Suspension

The Side and Taylor's are dry! The Oregon State Liquor Control Commission Friday announced the suspension of the beer-selling privileges of the Side and Taylor's for a fifteen day period. Student reaction to the suspension, was indicated by today's poll, was one of intellectual disapproval.

Don Castle—freshman in interior design—"I don't think it's quite fair to the proprietors. They did all they could. The Liquor Commission should have done more. Closing the Side and Taylor's won't solve the problem as students will get beer some place else."

Paul Wilson—sophomore in architecture—"They've been selling beer to college students for twenty years now. It's an established tradition. The suspension is a farce. I believe the Liquor Commission is making a mistake."

Diane Goddard—freshman in liberal arts—"I think that students are going to get beer anyway. Now they will have to go further off the campus. It doesn't seem to me that the University will benefit at all by the suspension."

Bob Brown—graduate student in business—"A fifteen day suspension won't do any good. Students will go outside to buy their beer and after the fifteen days are up they'll be back at the Side and Taylor's."

Kitty Lou Shaw—sophomore in art education—and **Betsy Erb**—sophomore in liberal arts—"The Liquor Commission is making an example of establishments on the campus which sell beer. There are countless groceries, drugstores and taverns that sell beer to students which should be checked."

Jack Evans—senior in English—"The suspension stinks! It seems rather childish to make a big fuss about something which doesn't make any difference anyway. If the kids are going to drink they will do it anyway. They are getting themselves in an up-roar over nothing."

Adeline Ehrlich—junior in biology—"The suspension might cause students to become better acquainted with places off the campus and thus create a situation similar to that at OSC where student drinking takes place in cars and roadside taverns."

Bill Hug—freshman in music—"I think the suspension is foolish because students will just go downtown to get beer. The fifteen day suspension won't make much of an impression. If the Liquor Commission was going to penalize the Side and Taylor's they should have imposed a stiffer penalty."

Marge Andrews—senior in psychology—"Suspension of the licenses of the Side and Taylor's won't stop drinking by minors or those over twenty-one. Responsibility should be laid on the shoulders of the minors. It is as much their concern as the proprietor's."

Ann Lawrence—freshman in journalism—"The boy who showed false ID in the Side is the person who should have received the punishment, not the proprietor."

The University Model Railroad Club, sponsored by the Transportation Corps of the Military Department, will hold its first meeting of the year at 3 p.m. today at 8 ROTC.

Lt. Col. John H. Cunningham, club adviser, announced that weekly meetings will be held each Wednesday to promote interest in model railroads.

This campus railroad club was promoted in November 1949 and since then has acquired substantial equipment and material, Cunningham explained. At present the club has an HO Gauge pike mounted on a 8' x 12' stand, two locomotives, a number of cars and considerable trackage, switches, controllers and other accessories. Material on hand is valued at about \$200.

Anyone interested in model railroads is invited to attend the adviser said. The club has no dues, no by-laws, and no officers. All equipment for operative purposes is furnished by the Transportation Corps of the U. S. Army.
