Tickets Going

Oregon's athletic department ticket division reported late yesterday that practically every seat in Mac court will be filled for tonight's struggle.

Today at 5:30 p.m. 1,500 general admission seats go on sale. They aren't expected to last long. Officials at OSC report the same demand for tickets to the Saturday

game. At Corvallis, Beaver ducat sellers will put 2,000 general admission seats on sale at 7 p.m. Saturday.

Oregon State will undoubtedly use its traditional Slats Gill weave in the two game series. Ball control and a slow game will be the desire of the Beavers.

Fast Game

On the other side, Oregon will go out ready to play its usual wide-open, race horse, fast break basketball—the kind the fans like.

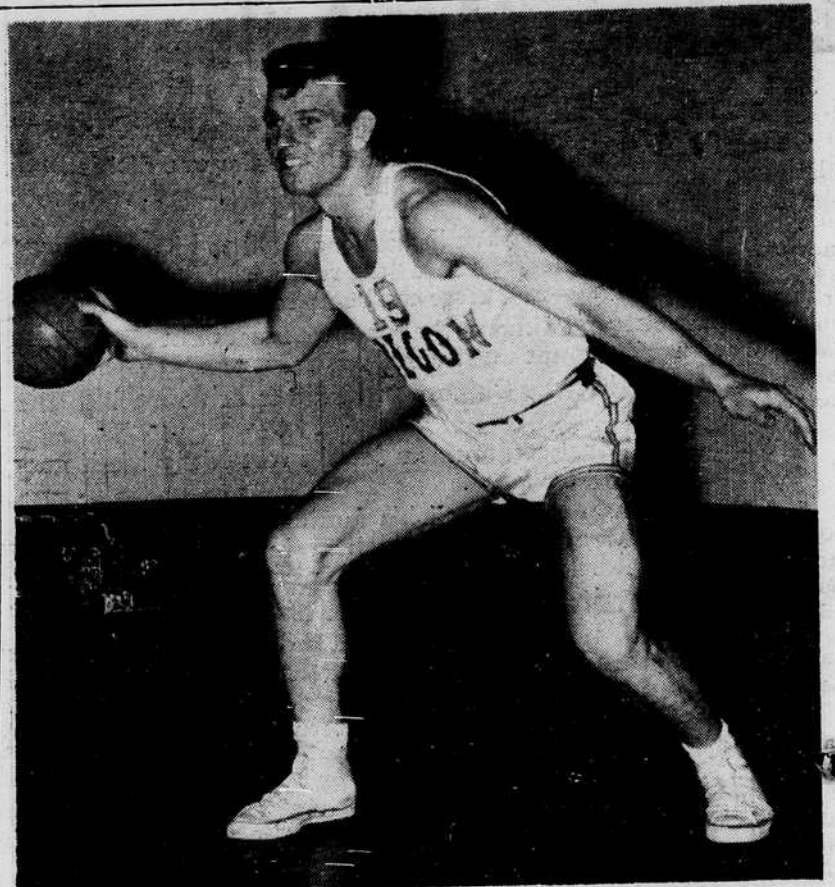
And when the Beavers try to slow the ball down, Oregon will go into its inside game—feeding the ball to the tall men under the basket and in the key hole.

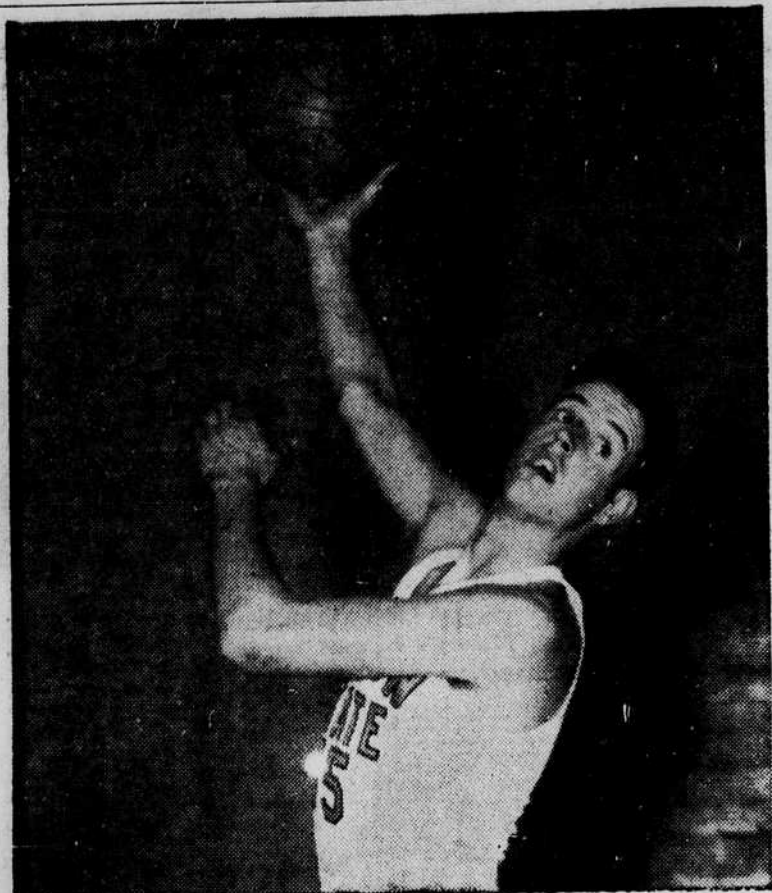

Frosh, Lebanon High Clash In Prelim Here; Warriors Tough Squad

The University of Oregon Frosh hoop artists will clash with the Lebanon High Warriors at 6:15 tonight in the McArthur Court preliminary to the Duck-OSC battle.

Probable starters for Coach Don Kirsch's Ducklings include Kenny Wegner and Bob Hawes, guards; Leon Keefe, center; and Ron Phillips and Barney Holland, forwards.

The Oregon Yearlings have a season's record of five wins and one loss. They defeated the Portland Frosh 49-44, the Linfield Frosh 66-42, the Oregon College of Education varsity 66-55, and the Oregon State Rooks 46-42 and 61-51.

Their only loss, a 48-43 Rook triumph last Friday, marked the termination of a 13-game Duckling victory string which included nine wins carried over from the 1949-50 season.

The Rooks were responsible for the only Frosh setback during the 1949-50 campaign when a 40-34 loss to the Rooks ruined an undefeated season for the Yearlings.

The Lebanon attack is spearheaded by high-soaring, high-scoring 6

foot, 5-inch Center Wayne Holz-fuss, who leads Willamette Valley League scorers with an average of 18.8 points per game.

Holz-fuss tallied 13 points as his team was routed 53-38 by the Salem Vikings in Lebanon's court appearance, which featured Lebanon's second loss of the season. The Warriors lacked brilliance at the free throw line. They tossed in only four of sixteen gift chances.

In addition to Holz-fuss, the Warrior starting lineup will probably include Forwards Bob Hinman and John Stolsig and Guards Bill Baker and Tom Summers.

The Oregon shooting pace has dropped off to slightly more than 74 shots per game. Early in the season the Ducks were pumping the ball at the basket more than 80 times per game.

Pi Kaps, Theta Chi, Stan Ray, Lambda Chi Win Rough IM Tilts

Pi Kappa Alpha won 23-7 over Delta Upsilon, Theta Chi topped Alpha 28-15, Stan Ray overwhelmed Omega 32-17, Alpha Tau Omega defeated Delta Tau Delta 17-12, Lambda Chi Alpha edged Cherney 15-10, and Merrick forfeited to Phi Kappa Sigma in "B" intramural games played Thursday.

The games as a whole were rough, but the teams did better than had been the case in previous "B" encounters.

The Pi Kaps simply outran and outshot DU; they piled up a 16-3 halftime margin and stretched it to 23-7 at the final whistle.

Speedy guard Oscar Shoemaker hit ten points for the winners and concluded his afternoon's activities by fouling out. Ward Bebb earned seven more for Pi KA, and DU Len Schroeder's four points were the top for his ballclub.

A football quarter back, Hal Dunham, led Theta Chi to a 28-15 verdict over Alpha with eleven points. The general tone of the game sometimes strongly suggested football—action was of the knock-down drag-out variety. Tall Bob Morse of Alpha hit eight points to lead his team. Theta Chi held a halftime lead of 12-4 and were ahead 20-7 when the fourth period began.

Stan Ray went on a scoring spree in the last half of its game against Omega; the Vets Dorm boys scored Twenty points and fashioned a 32-17 victory.

Forward Dick Reedy and guard Lowell Schuck were the pacemakers in this Stan Ray surge with twelve points apiece.

Fred Hiat contributed eight

counters to the Omega cause. The game was very slow and ragged until play picked up in the latter stages.

ATO successfully held off a strong Delt rally in the final quarter to win 17-12. The victors had used their fast break and backboard dominance in coasting to leads at the half and third period.

ATO guard Bill Kirby was high for both teams with six, followed by Delt center George Guldager with five.

Lambda Chi was leading by a slender 5-4 margin after a slow first half with Cherney, but the fraternity men found enough scoring punch to go ahead 12-6 at the three-quarter mark and win 15-10 in another rough game.

Frank Carl of Cherney and Ken Beers of Lambda Chi were tied for scoring honors with six points each.
