

Oregon, WSC in Tie for Division Lead

Oregon's Webfoots, sharing the crest of the Northern Division race with WSC, this week go into preparation for the tough four-games-in-five-nights Inland Empire tour.

The Ducks meet Idaho Friday and Saturday in Moscow, then follow with a Monday and Tuesday series against Washington State in Pullman.

At the same time, Oregon State will be meeting Washington in Seattle Friday and Saturday nights.

Oregon defeated OSC twice over the weekend—62-53 Friday night in McArthur court and 66-47 in Corvallis Saturday.

From the spectator standpoint, Friday's game was the best. The lead changed hands ten times during the game, and not until the last half of the second period, when OSC struck a scoring drought, was there any indication of who would come out on top.

Lead Jumps

With 11 minutes and 40 seconds remaining in the Friday game, Oregon had a scant 44-42 lead. Two minutes and 5 seconds later Oregon

was on top of a 54-42 count. Then the Beavers got going once more and managed to cut the lead to nine points by the end of the game.

Oregon's superiority Friday night was mostly in backboard strength. The Ducks gathered in 49 rebounds as against 36 for OSC. Marksmanship, too, made a difference.

In the first half of Friday's game, Oregon shot .325 (13 for 40) while Oregon State shot .324 (12 for 37). Oregon led at the half, 33-29.

But the final shooting percentages, showed Oregon with a .338 eye, while the Beavers had slumped to a .297.

Peterson on Boards

Of the 49 Webfoot rebounds Friday night, incidentally, Bob Peterson grabbed 17 and Jim "Moose" Loscutt off 12.

Oregon's Saturday night victory in Corvallis was simply a case of backboard power and Beaver inability to hit the hoop.

The Ducks again had a good shooting mark—although not as torrid as that of Friday—with a .323 (21 for 65). Oregon State tal-

lied a miserable 13 out of 56 tries for .232.

At half-time Saturday, Oregon boasted a 29-15 lead. In the first part of the second half, the Orange started a brief rally which cut the lead to nine points, but the timely insertion of Webfoot Forward Mel Streeter turned the tide for Oregon, and the Ducks once again started upward.

Streeter Hooks Shot

Streeter swished through the Beaver defense for a cripple shot and cut the rally short—just as he had done Friday night after Ore-

gon Coach John Warren sent him in when Oregon led by only one point. Streeter helped change the course of events that night with a swishing hook shot.

The Friday contest was comparatively free of personal fouls—as Duck-Beaver games go. Oregon State was called 24 times, while Oregon got the whistle 21 times.

The Beavers picked up 15 points on free throws, while Oregon took 14.

But Saturday night the two teams—especially the Beavers—

indulged in closer checking. And a grand total of 51 fouls were marked up 29 against OSC and 22 against Oregon.

Three Beavers, Glen Kinney, Jim Nau, and Danny Johnston, took to the bench with five personals against them. Mel Krause of Oregon was also excused from the playing floor with five personals.

Ducks Pull Away

After the first few seconds, Oregon led all the way. Beaver Forward Bob Payne took a free throw to put up a one point OSC lead, but from then on it was all Oregon.

Bob Peterson dropped in a gift shot, Curt Barcay hit from the field, Mel Krause flipped in a one-hander, and the Ducks were off. From then on Oregon State trailed behind them. In the first half, Oregon State got only 5 field goals, while Oregon took 11.

Free throws were important in the Saturday game. Oregon took 24 and OSC got 21. Bob Peterson, high for the game with 13 points, got 9 of these on gift shots.

Chi Psi Overwhelmed; Phi Delts, Stitzer, Fiji, Minturn, Sigma Nu Win

Stitzer hall squeezed out a 12-11 win over Philadelphia house in the only close A game. The game was featured by rough playing and bad passing on both sides.

Led by former-Frosh player Bob Stout the Stitzer-men went ahead 9-5 at halftime and were never behind. Stout scored seven points for the winners.

Phi Gamma Delta romped to a 34-6 rout of a hapless Pi Kappa Phi aggregation. Displaying a large height advantage, the Fijis moved out to a 19-2 lead at the half and maintained their pace until the end of the contest. Mike Lally led the point making parade for the winners with 11.

Minturn Wins

Minturn hall squeezed out a 20-16 overtime victory over Beta Theta Pi to highlight the B clashes. The score was deadlocked several times throughout the regulation playing period but Dick Ward iced up the contest for Minturn in the overtime by dropping in two field goals.

Ken Ball led scoring for the Bettas and for the game by hemping 12 counters. Dale White came through with six to lead Minturn.

Sigma Nu had an easy time with Gamma hall in the only other B league clash, dumping the Straub boys 29-8. The boys from eleventh street led 14-2 at the half. Bill Gurney led scoring for the losers with four counters while Sigma Nu Earl Averill was high for the game with nine.

IM All-Stars Picked; Slate Preliminary Tilt

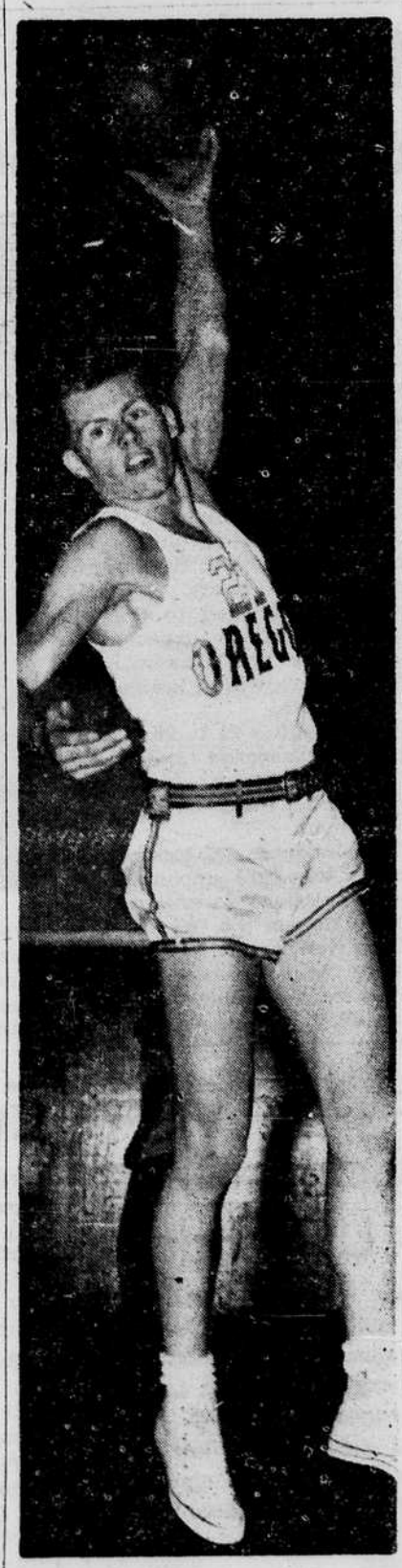

Frosh Trip Lebanon, Prepare for OCE Tilt

Coach Don Kirsch's University of Oregon Frosh routed the Lebanon High Warriors 64-37 Friday night in a McArthur Court hoop contest.

It was the 15th victory in 16 games for the Ducklings, who have taken six out of seven during the present campaign. Their only setback was a 48-43 loss to the Oregon State Rooks.

The Yearlings grabbed an early 17-5 lead and remained in front throughout the contest. Leading 26-20 at halftime, the Frosh scored a quick 16 points during the next five minutes to gain an impressive 42-21 advantage.

The Duckling regulars then withdrew from the field of combat and substitutes began streaming into the fray. Thirteen Oregon Yearlings participated in the contest and twelve of them hit the scoring columns.

Holland Tops Scorers

Forward Barney Holland led Frosh scorers with 12 points and was closely followed by Guard Bob Hawes, who tallied 11. The Duckling reserves scored 30 of the team's 64 counters.

The Yearlings dropped in 14 of 21 free throws for a .667 average, one of their highest of the season. They made only 36 gift tosses in 59 attempts during their two-game series with the OSC Rooks the previous weekend.

Coach Kirsch's Ducklings will meet the Oregon College of Education varsity Tuesday night at Monmouth. They will travel to Corvallis for their next engagement, a Friday night clash with the OSC Rooks.

Oregon will meet the Rooks again on Tuesday, February 6, at Corvallis. The Frosh will battle the Eugene High Axemen Saturday, February 10, at Eugene and will face the Portland Frosh the following Tuesday in McArthur Court.

Varsity Whips Frosh in Squad Swimming Meet

Oregon's varsity swimming team cracked a three year intra-squad losing streak Saturday when it churned to a 47-37 victory over the Frosh and ineligible.

The Frosh took an early lead at the half-way mark but the varsity came back strong and went on to take the last relay and win the meet.

Louis Santos, Joe Nishimoto, Jim Allan, and Pete Van Dijk negotiated the 400 yards freestyle relay in the time of 3:41.7, lowering the old varsity mark of 3:42.2.

An upset was registered when Yoshinobu Terada, Milton Kotoshirodo, and Herny Kaiura, swimming for the frosh in the 300 yards medley relay, took this event by beating the strong varsity team composed of Van Dijk, Nishimoto, and Santos.

Terada, swimming the backstroke leg on the medley relay, unofficially went below the pool record by .4 second as he finished with a 1:02.4.

The only double winner of the meet was Gordon Edwards. He took the 220 and 440 yards freestyle.
