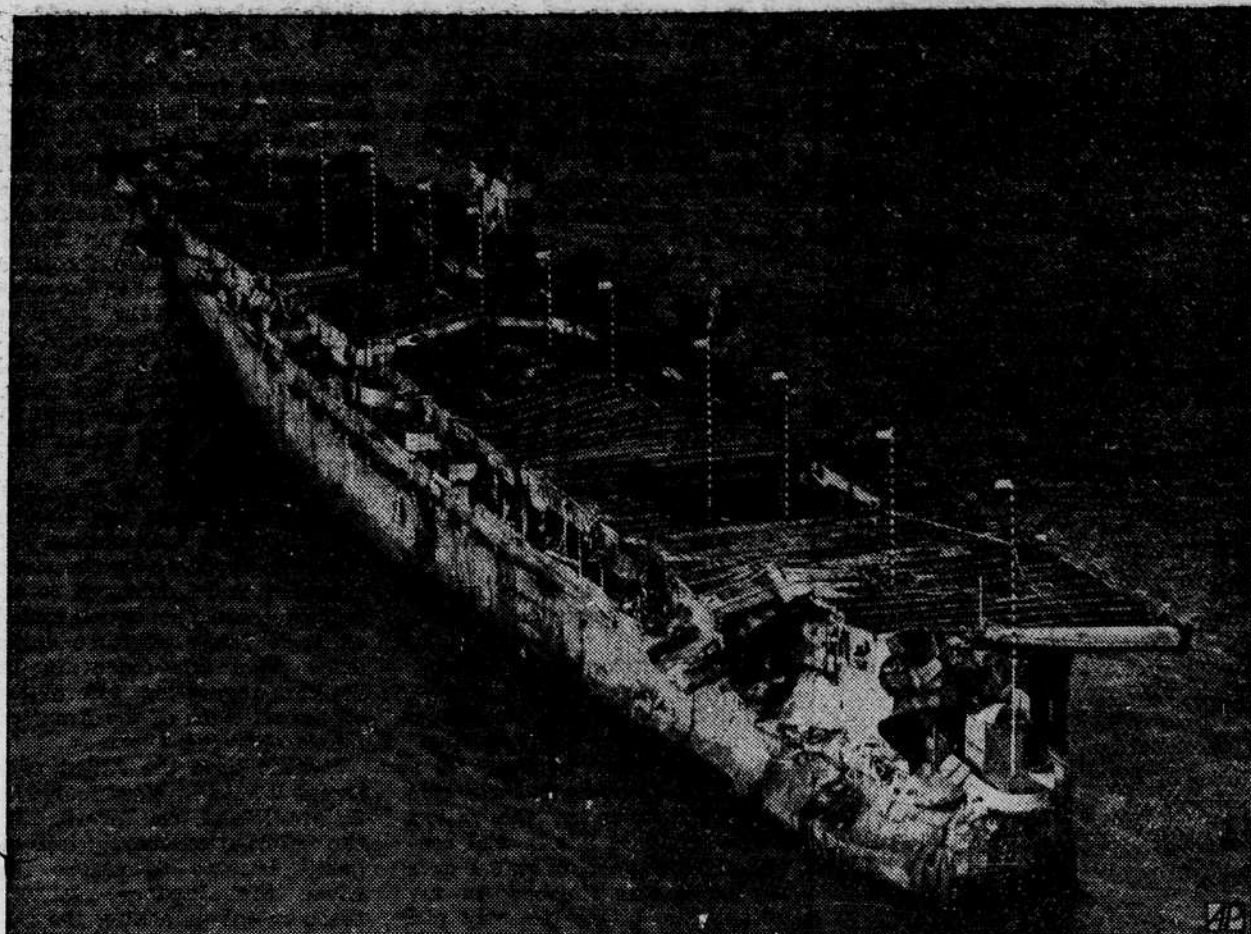


'Independence' on Last Voyage

Professor Given Grant For Archeological Study

L. S. Cressman, professor of anthropology, will start a five-year archeological project covering the Oregon coastal area this summer.

This project is made possible under a \$2,500 grant from the Viking Fund, Inc., of New York.

Cressman and those associated with him have done extensive work in south central Oregon. The Oregon coast, however, is almost untouched by archeologists. The central part of the state has had most of the attention from researchers.

The Columbia River Basin and the area affected by the McNary Dam site has been searched during the work of the River Basins Survey under the Smithsonian Institution.

The complete picture of Oregon and its archeological story are expected to be rounded out through the work of this project.

No digging will be done this summer. The first year's work will consist of surveying in order to find sites of archeological value and to evaluate these sites as places for "digs."

Survey work will be supervised by some experienced person, probably a graduate of this institution, under Dr. Cressman's supervision.

Cressman's work in the Oregon country has recently been given national attention. He has been a Guggenheim Fellow twice and his work has been supported by national research groups.
