

Allied Tanks Begin Resistance Move

Allied tank columns chewed into the main Red defense lines south of the 38th parallel Tuesday and ground ahead against stiffening Chinese resistance.

United Nations air, naval, and artillery barrages paved the way for the attacks. Allied foot soldiers, slogging behind the tanks, wiped out nests of Reds.

The Chinese threw tank warfare into the battle for the first time in this phase of the Korean war. They rushed reinforcements south from Seoul over a plank bridge spanning the Han River. There were indications that this was a big effort to salute the outset of the Chinese lunar year.

The Soviet Bloc Tried Unsuccessfully...

... Tuesday to force the U. N. Political Committee to listen to a 30-page statement from Communist China backing Russian charges of American aggression against Chinese territory.

Chou En-Lai, foreign minister of Red China, had sent the committee a cable Monday demanding that Peiping's views be presented.

At Tuesday afternoon's meeting Polish delegate Juliusz Katz-Suchy formally proposed that Chou's request be granted. He was supported by Soviet delegate Semyon K. Tsarapkin. The committee, however, voted 32 to 6 against having a statement read. It voted 39 to 0 in favor of circulating the statement.

U. S. Withdrawal from the United Nations...

... was called for Tuesday by Representative John Rankin (Dem.-Miss.). He said that the U. N. is dominated by an "international gang" seeking to undermine American sovereignty.

"The sooner we withdraw from this monstrosity the better," Rankin told the House Foreign Affairs Committee in a Tuesday session.

The Mississippi representative was one of a number of House members appearing before the foreign affairs group in behalf of bills aimed at bearing down on Communist countries.

Soviet Russia Has Refused to Budge...

... on the issue of Western Germany's rearmament, Western diplomats believed Monday. Observers say that the Soviet notes handed representatives of the three Western governments Monday are probably another step in this program.

The essence of the messages is believed to be a forceful reiteration of the Soviet attitude that German demilitarization, as provided under the Potsdam agreement, must be the first problem considered by the big powers along a path to any settlement of the tense world situation.

Pope Pius Tuesday Urged His Church's Pastors...

... and Lenten preachers to intensify their efforts to bring to Roman Catholicism those far from it. In an annual address, on the Even of Lent, the Pope addressed his message primarily to churchmen in Rome, but his words by inference were extended to other great cities and to the countryside throughout the world.

Railroad Switchmen Returned to Work...

... in many important centers Tuesday, but there was no general back-to-work move. Senator Humphrey (Dem.-Minn.) said in Washington that he had good reason "to be optimistic a settlement of the rail strike may be imminent."

The crippling "sick call" strike ended in the New York area. Switchmen went back to their jobs in large numbers at Philadelphia, Boston, Washington, Baltimore, Chattanooga, Buffalo, and other large cities, but the walkout kept a stranglehold on much of the nation's war-gear economy.

The Sick-leave Strike Went On...

... with no apparent let-up Tuesday in the Pacific Northwest. There was little sign of the back-to-work moves that occurred elsewhere.

The Union Pacific Railroad had to call on supervisory personnel to move a troop train out of Portland Sunday, L. A. Collins, northwest general manager, said Tuesday. "Even after appeals were made to the general chairman of the Brotherhood of Railroad Trainmen, it was still necessary to use supervisory personnel to operate the train," he said.

The Latest Atomic Explosion Tuesday...

... on the Nevada bomb range threw a bluish white flash into the sky, northern California witnesses generally agreed.

Thousands of early-rising television fans in the metropolitan area of Los Angeles saw Tuesday's atomic explosion from the comfort of their easy chairs, as two TV stations televised the view.

"We Got a Nice Reaction"...

... on a geiger counter that was taken out into the rain near Olympia Tuesday morning, Washington State Geologist Sheldon L. Glover said Tuesday, a few hours after the atomic blast was set off north of Las Vegas, Nev.

"It may not mean a thing," Glover quickly added. "Maybe we would always get such a reaction. We've never tested the rain before. Perhaps the rain drops become ionized as they drop through the atmosphere, thus making it possible for them to affect the geiger counter."

He was inclined to discount any connection between the atomic tests in Las Vegas and the effect of the rain on the counter, although he said that it was a possibility.

The One-Hundredth American Ship...

... bearing arms for France under the Atlantic Pact agreement arrived in Cherbourg Tuesday. The ship, "American Merchant," unloaded 1678 tons of material. It had first unloaded most of its cargo at Brest.

The Defense and Prosecution Rested...

... at 12:06 p.m. (PST) Tuesday in the perjury trial of William W. Remington. Federal Judge Gregory F. Noonan said that the case would go to the jury this afternoon.

The defense will present its summation this morning and the government in the early afternoon. Then Judge Noonan will deliver his charge to the jury of seven women and five men.

5th Oregon Graduate in Year Gets Regular Army Commission

Gerald E. Harris, fall term graduate of the University, has been appointed an infantry second lieutenant in the Regular Army of the United States, according to Col. Frank R. Maerdian, University military department head.

Lieut. Harris is the fifth Oregon graduate to receive an appointment in the regular army within the past year.

He has received orders to report to the Infantry School, Fort Benning, Ga. for a four-months company officers' course. He will then report for duty with the 2nd Armored Division at Camp Hood, Tex.

While attending the University Harris was active in the Reserve

Officers Training Program. He was a member of the color guard during his sophomore year; a cadet staff sergeant when a junior; and a cadet captain in his senior year. Harris earned the designation of Distinguished Military Student during college and later Distinguished Military Graduate.

Harris' wife and son, now residing in Eugene, will join him at Camp Hood.
