

Curt Barclay Leads Webfoot Attack

Five minutes were gone in the second half before the Cougars did any real scoring. With the score standing at 47-38, and both second platoons in the game, three Cougars got free throws to make it a seven point difference for the Ducks.

At that point, both first units went back off the bench and Loscutoff and Barclay potted a pair of baskets from close in to raise the margin to 11 points.

George Rosser and Leon Mangis grabbed three free throws off a pair of personal fouls whistled on Curt Barclay, his only fouls of the evening.

A push shot by Oregon's Ken Hunt from the side and a free throw by Peterson lifted the Duck margin to 54-43, eleven points once more with 8 minutes and 55 seconds

remaining in the game.

Then the second platoon went at it again, and Big Dave Roberts, WSC second-stringer center, swished two beautiful hook shots from the key to make it 54-47.

Frank Mataya took two free throws and George Rosser potted a push shot when he returned to the game with the first five. That brought the count to a dangerous 55-51.

And the Cougars made it even more dangerous with about four and a half minutes left when Eric Roberts slipped around for a lay-in and left the Ducks with a mere two point margin.

Then three quick free throws, two by Barclay and one by Jack Keller, plus a Peterson push shot from the key gave Oregon more breathing room, 60-53.

Free Throws Many

The only other shot by WSC that really counted came with just less than 3 minutes left in the game when Mangis slipped through for another lay-in—60-55.

From there on out, the Webfoots made a steady procession to the free-throw line, and raised the count three points. This was added

to when Peterson hove through another push shot to make it 65-55.

Oregon's last point came when Barclay was awarded two gift tries on a personal by Streamer and made good on one. With the game down to the last fraction of a second, and the ball under WSC's basket, the Ducks stood and watched a Cougar rebound be taken by Streamer—he pushed it up for the last WSC score, and that made the final count 66-57, Oregon.

Washington State made the mistake of trying to run with Oregon. The Cougars did it part of the way in the first half, but in the second period, they came out and made an honest attempt to fast break several times.

But the Palouse hills team just couldn't do it. The Cats booted the ball away 16 times during the game, as compared to an unusually high nine times for the Webfoots.

Duck Shooting Low, Too

Oregon shooting in the second half was not extraordinary at .257, but it was better than WSC's .212. The Ducks got 8 field goals in this period, as to 7 for WSC, but the

rest was in free throws, with the Cougars trying for the ball more and more as the game wore on.

In the first half, the score was tied 10 times, and the lead changed hands 7 times. Oregon got the initial advantage, when Loscutoff and Barclay made their first two attempts from the field. But Cougars Eric Roberts and Pete Mullins put WSC up with a hook shot, a free throw, and a long from the corner by the Australian.

The two teams go at it again tonight in McArthur court—8 o'clock.

Other Duck scorers were Keller with three, all free throws, John Neeley with 3, Hunt with 6, and Mel Krause with 1. Krause and Neeley played a sparkling defensive game for Oregon, and their passing into the big men under the baskets helped put the heavy scoring margin where it was.

Frosh Win

In the preliminary game last night, the Oregon Frosh smacked the frosh from Portland university, 63-41. The Ducklings grabbed a big advantage when Portland failed to score a field goal in the first 16 minutes of the game.
