Registration for Sping Quarter To Commence on Saturday

Advance registration for spring term begins Saturday, when registration material will be available in the art gallery on the second floor of the Student Union.

Conferences with advisers and registering with department clerks will begin Monday and will continue until next Friday. Final checking, filing of cards in the registrar's office, and payment of fees if desired, may be done until Mar. 3, Registrar Clifford L. Constance said.

Students who have any intention of registering for spring term should at least complete the process as far as filing their cards with the registrar, he emphasized. Those who do not go that far and decide later to register will be assessed an \$8 penalty fee for failure to complete advance registration.

Cards and procedure are the same as for winter term, according to Constance. A new time schedule of classes will be available.

Manifesto In Bulletin Held `Red'

An article in the January Bulletin of the Oregon Federation of College Leaders follows the Communist party line, the Eastern Oregon College of Education Student Council decided Wednesday evening.

The council demanded an explanation of an article appearing in the bulletin under the heading: "Appeal of the Second Congress of the International Union of Students to the Students of the World." The article called for "immediate cessation of bombing of the civilian population in Korea, cessation of war in Korea, withdrawal of foreign troops from its territory, and address to the U. N. Security Council of petitions for peaceful settlement of the Korean question."

At Oregon State College Tom Faught, editor of the bulletin, explained that it presented articles from various points of view, without comment or endorsement, to allow college students to know (Please turn to page eight)
