Frosh Trounce Rooks, Score 62-38 Victory, Lead 6-1 In Series

The Oregon Freshmen routed the Oregon State College Rooks, 62-38, Wednesday night in McArthur Court, scoring victory number 20 in 21 starts, and their sixth win in seven games in the eight-game series with the Rooks.

The Rooks jumped to an early 7-6 lead, but a combination of Baby Beaver errors and deadly Duckling jump-shooting was too much for the OSC lads.


