

Dads' Day Lunch Tickets On Sale in Emerald Hall

Only 200 Dads' Day luncheon tickets have been sold and many more should be bought by Friday if students and fathers plan to attend, according to Karl W. Onthank, executive secretary of Oregon Dads.

Tickets cost \$1.25 and may be purchased in 216 Emerald from Mrs. Lowe.

Speakers to be featured at the luncheon, which will be held in the Student Union, are University President H. K. Newburn, who will discuss "The Effects of Mobilization," and Chancellor C. D. Byrne of the State System of Higher Education, who will explain the legislature system and budget of the University.

Basketball game tickets for Saturday's game between the Webfoots and the University of Washington Huskies can be purchased by fathers upon registration, and not before, as previously stated in the Emerald.

They will cost \$1.20 and will be in the general admission section. Reserved tickets are all sold out, Onthank said.

Jeanne Hoffman, decorations chairman, urges living organizations to start working on their signs immediately. The theme for the weekend is "Dad—Our King for a Day."

Not over \$10 is to be spent for signs, which must be two dimensional with no moving parts.

All Dads' Day chairmen are requested to meet at 4 p.m. today in 204 Emerald, according to Dave Rodway, general chairman.

Hawk Ends State Tour

Dean of Men Ray Hawk returned Saturday night from a six-day tour of Southern Oregon high schools, during which he talked to more than 200 seniors planning to enter the University this fall.

Hawk said representatives from Oregon State College, Southern Oregon College of Education, and Oregon Tech made up the traveling group. Similar high school relations committees for the Oregon State System of Higher Education are being arranged to interview high school seniors in other parts of the state.

The tours, which began two weeks ago, are scheduled to continue into March. Hawk said that nearly every high school in the state will be reached during this time.

Wickham is Talking

This week Mrs. Golda Wickham, dean of women, is talking to students in the Portland high schools.

In all, Hawk's group held 10 meetings. These brought out 207 students who plan to attend the University after graduation. Purpose of the meetings was to explain what each of the colleges had to offer in the way of scholarships, living facilities, and curricula.

The most frequent question asked during the tour, according to Hawk, came from male students who wanted an idea of how long they could plan on staying in school if 18-year-olds became eligible for the draft. Inquiries were also made of opportunities in ROTC.

Political Science Students Plan For Honorary

A petition for the organization of an Oregon chapter of the national political science honorary, Pi Sigma Alpha, is now being drawn up by Barry Mountain, senior in political science.

Twelve Interested

The petition will be presented to the political science department for approval next week, Mountain said Monday. If approved the group will become active immediately, with approximately 12 political science majors already showing interest in the honorary.

Adviser to the group will be a member of the political science department. Members of the faculty who are affiliated with the national honorary are E. S. Wengert, head of the political science department; C. P. Schleicher, Vincent Ostrom, and H. E. Dean, professors of political science.

Council Set-Up

In connection with the organization of the honorary would be the setting up of a branch of the Collegiate Council for the United Nations. This Council, which stimulates understanding and interest in the U.N., would be a natural project for a political science group to sponsor, Mountain pointed out.

Morris Sahr, senior in political science, has obtained information on the Council, which now has 73 chapters on college campuses in the United States. First organized in 1946, COUN is the college affiliate of the American Association for the United Nations, Inc.

Dale Daugherty, graduate assistant in physical education, was named chairman of Sports Night at a meeting of the ASUO Executive Council last night.

Chosen co-chairman for the All-Campus Vodvil was Bill Lees.

President Barry Mountain announced that the council's request for an audit of student funds had been granted. Dick Williams, in charge of the educational activities fund, has asked that the council schedule a joint meeting with the Student Union Board which is also interested in hearing the financial report. This meeting will be arranged next week.

Howard Lemons, athletic business manager, has agreed to bring a financial report on student athletic funds to the council.

Mountain announced that petitions for senior representative on the Exec Council are due in the ASUO offices by 5 p.m. Friday. A screening committee, composed of junior and sophomore representatives, will meet to interview applicants. The vacancy on the Council was caused by Senior Representative Don Smith's resignation.

Voting Explained

Donald W. DuShane, director of student affairs, explained the preferential voting system to be used in campus elections under the new ASUO constitution.
