Ebbighausen Lectures Tonight

E. G. Ebbighausen, associate professor of physics, will speak on "The Space Between the Stars" at 7:30 tonight in the Browsing Room in the Student Union.

R. T. Ellickson, associate dean of the graduate school and head of the physics department, will lead the discussion.

Ebbighausen received the Ph.D. degree at the University of Chicago in 1940. His thesis was on "Star Clusters." He has taught at Wilson College in Pennsylvania and the University of Pittsburgh, and was also on the staff of the Westinghouse Research Laboratories and the Buhl Planetarium. Ebbighausen is a member of Sigma Xi, the American Physics Society, and the American Astronomical Society.

This lecture will be based on material lying between the stars—its origin, its distribution, its motion, and its chemical composition. Slides will also be shown.

This will be the seventh in the Lecture-Forum Series, which is sponsored by the Association of Patrons and Friends of the University of Oregon Library, and the University Library. These lectures are open to the public.
