Fall '51 Rolls May Decline

The University will have an enrollment of 4,624 students in the fall term of next year, according to an estimate by the Oregon State System of Higher Education. The estimate appeared in the Feb. 17 issue of the Oregon Voter.

According to the same source, Oregon State College will have 5.250 students next fall. This represents a drop of 10.8 per cent over this fall's enrollment for both schools.



Total enrollment in all Oregon schools of higher education has been declining steadily since the peak year of 1947-48, when some 19,000 were registered, according to the Oregon Voter.
