Eugene Hospital Okayed for Interns

EUGENE —(P)— Sacred Heart Hospital has been approved by the American Medical Association as a center for training medical interns, Dr. Sidney Hoffman, chairman of the medical staff's intern committee, reported today.

The training program will begin July 1, 1952, he said. Approval has been granted for training six interns.

Dr. Hoffman said construction of a new \$1,500,000 wing at Sacred Heart, now being built, was a large factor in winning approval of the intern training application.

He pointed out that no other Oregon hospital, outside of Portland, has been approved for internships.

Prep Papers Vie for Awards
