Festival Features 22 Countries

Twenty-ene foreign countries were represented by students from the University of Oregon and Oregon State College, at the YM-YWCA International Festival Saturday afternoon.

Clifford E. Maser, dean of the School of Business and Technology at Oregon State College, presented the main address of the Festival at a luncheon Saturday nopn.

Americans and Europeans differ in many respects, Maser stated, but have in common a pride in their own countries.

Among the differences in the two ways of life according to Maser, is that the American family life is characterized by the affection while European family life is characterized by respect. Americans think less about their community and more about world affairs than do Europeans, Maser said.

Following the luncheon an informal coffee hour in Alumni Hall was attended by about 150 persons. Martel Scroggin was master of ceremonies for the entertainment presented by the foreign students and members of the YWCA freshman music commission.

Another difference between the two peoples cited by Maser is the fact that most Americans speak only one language, while the European usually speaks several. "This is neither good nor bad," according to Dr. Maser "but is due to geographic conditions."
