T. T. Hutchens of the Oregon medical school biochemistry department has been awarded a research fellowship by National Institute of Health, headed Dr. David W. E. Baird, of the school.

Fellowship was awarded for study of metabolism of cholesterol at the medical school radioisotope laboratory. The fellowship is effective in June. Dr. E. Hutchens, head of the medical school biochemistry department, will furnish general guidance for Dr. Hutchens.

Recently, Dr. Hutchens took a week course in the use of radioisotopes in medicine at the Ridge Institute of Nuclear Studies, Oak Ridge, Tenn.
