

Baseball Squad Meets Linfield Here Today

The Oregon Ducks will open their 1951 baseball season against the Linfield Wildcats at 3:30 this afternoon on Howe Field, Oregon's home diamond.

Jim Hanns will probably hold the starting pitching assignment for Coach Don Kirsch's Webfoots. John Pyle and Stan Aune also might see some action on the mound, while Jack Smith will handle the receiving chores.

Left-handed Phil Settecase, a junior will probably start at first base for the Ducks. Settecase is an outstanding defensive player and also is potent at the plate. He compiled a .312 batting average while playing for the Frosh in 1949.

Little Daryle Nelson, who transferred from Vanport for the 1950 campaign, will start at second base, while New Yorker Ray Coley, who once played in the national semi-pro tournament, is the major candidate for starting shortstop honors.

Nick Schmer, Jefferson High football and basketball luminary, probably will start at third base.

Presentation of a student fees registration receipt will be sufficient for admission to Oregon's home baseball games and home track meets during spring term. No athletic activity cards are being issued.

Denver Cops Ski Tourney At Mt. Hood

GOVERNMENT CAMP, Ore. (AP) The Wegeman brothers, members of the U. S. Olympic team, led favored Denver University to the National Intercollegiate Four-Way Ski Championship on Mt. Hood Sunday.

Keith Wegeman placed second in jumping, the final-day event, and brother Paul was fourth. In addition Tom Hoffman of Denver was sixth and this—combined with results from cross-country, downhill and slalom events earlier—gave Denver the title with 26.3 points.

Washington State, led by a Norwegian exchange student, Torbjorn Falkanger, emerged second in team totals with 35.1 points. The University of Washington was third at 58.3. Seven other western colleges followed.

Falkanger Leads
Falkanger, a slight, blond stylist, was far ahead of the field in the jumping on a hill constructed especially for this meet. It was a short hill, so his longest leap was 139 feet, but that was tops for the day. A crowd of 1800 watched under a warm sun.

Paced by Falkanger, Washington State won the team jumping title. Teammate Olav Hoff placed fifth, and Laurs Forland, seventh. That gave Washington State a total of 10.6 points, followed by Denver with 11.5; Montana State 31.6, Utah 33.4, Washington 35.9, Portland 40.3, Wyoming 41, Nevada 45.8, Seattle 51.6; Stanford 59.

Wegeman Wins Crown
Keith Wegeman also won the individual four-way crown with a total of 387.6 points. Next were Falkanger with 382.6, Paul Wegeman with 361.2, Magnus Bucher of Denver with 356.5, and David Christensen of Utah with 344.6.

The skiers jumped three times today, the best two leaps counting the top six:

1. Torbjorn Falkanger, Washington State, 137 and 139 feet—230.9 points.
2. Keith Wegeman, Denver: 137 and 124 feet—221.5 points.
3. Thor Hauge, Montana State: 126 and 130 feet—214.8 points.
4. Paul Wegeman, Denver: 127 and 124 feet—205.8 points.
5. Olav Hoff, Washington State: 123 and 114 feet—202.7 points.
6. Tom Hoffman, Denver: 125 and 122 feet—201.5 points.

Juniors, Seniors Win Track Meet

Sophomore Miler Fred Turner's sprinting effort at the end of the three-quarter mile race in Saturday's Webfoot inter-squad track meet gave him a win over veteran Jack Hutchins.

Hutchins, mile champion of the Northern Division, was out-kicked by Turner at the end of the race. It was the upset win of the meet.

The junior-senior team beat out the other squad, composed of freshmen and sophomores. But the youngsters had their share of victories.

Beside the surprise win by Turner in the three-quarter, the younger set also won the 75-yard dash (representing the 100), with Jerry Mock breaking the tape in 7.7 seconds, and other events.

Backlund Wins

The other distance run of the day, the mile and one-half (representing the two-mile race) was won easily by Art Backlund in 7 minutes, 17 seconds. Last year, Backlund ran behind Hutchins in the mile, but this year is "stronger and faster," according to Cinder Coach Bill Bowerman.

Other events showed:
High hurdles—Won by Larry Blunt in 9.2 seconds. This was over a 70 yard course, instead of the regular 120 yards, and over fewer hurdles.

Packwood Vaults

Pole Vault—Won by Ray Packwood, going over 12 feet 660-yard race—Won by veteran half-miler Walt McClure in 1:24.9, which Bowerman called good for this time of year.

150 yard dash—Won by Al Bullier, wearing sweat clothes, in 16.2 seconds. This race, of course, represented the 220 yard dash.

Low hurdles—Won by another vet, Denny Sullivan in 16 seconds. This was over fewer hurdles, and the course was 140 yards long, instead of the usual 220.

Countryman Triumphs
330-yard dash—Representing the quarter-mile, won by Jack Countryman in 37.2 seconds. No other events were run Saturday.

Bowerman will schedule time trials Wednesday afternoon, weather permitting. The Webfoots get their first meet competition Saturday against Oregon State and several other smaller colleges in the Willamette Relays at Salem.

The following Saturday will send Oregon against the Washington Huskies in Seattle for the first Oregon division dual meet of the season.

Bowling Film to Run All Week at Union

Two Duck bowling teams defeated two teams representing the Timber Bowl of Springfield Saturday afternoon.

It was the first half of a special home and home match arranged by Louie Bellissimo of the Student Union. The return match will be played at 1:30 p.m. Saturday afternoon at the Student Union.

Bob Hanberg's 584 series and Pete Darlington's 528 led the first team to a comfortable 171 pin lead over the Timber Bowl team. The score was 2368 to 2197.

Hanberg had the highest series of the afternoon. Ken Ireland, Bruce Koppe, and Carroll-Reekman were the other members of the Duck squad.

Mert Meeker, bowling for the second University team, had the highest game of the afternoon with a 212. His series of 565, aided by Clarence Naapi's 526 and Ned Takasumi's 521, led the University team to a convincing 421-pin lead over the other Timber Bowl team.

Vern Thompson and Jack Heading also bowled for the second Oregon team. The final score was 2266 to 2145.

Ping Pong Meet Set For April 7
