
awards. The Order of the O discussed this question earlier this week, but the members failed to reach an agreement.

A similar situation existed in the spring of 1947. Awards for golf and tennis were under consideration. It finally was decided to give no minor awards and to give letters only to those who demonstrate hard work as well as ability.

Whether or not this policy will apply to skiing has not been determined. President Mountain recently stated that he had discussed the matter with the ASUO Executive Council and that "we realize that skiing is in the embryo stage and in order to continue to make it a major sport at the University, the Executive Council is going to do all in their power to promote and encourage the continuance of the ski team."

"One of the possible ways of encouraging skiing at the University of Oregon," he added, "is to award varsity letters to those men who have proven themselves to be top skiers and qualifying as such for a varsity award."

Mountain concluded, "I know that they will be able to make a very fine showing this weekend at the Sugar Bowl in California . . . and through their efforts in this meet, we hope that the decision of awarding letters will be made easier." We hope so,
