# Aggie Extra-Base Hits Defeat Ducks, Webfoots Meet Portlanders Today

Extra-base hits were as commonplace as water in a lake as the Oregon State Beavers downed the Oredon Ducks 10-4 in a Thursday afternoon Howe Field clash.

Coach Don Kirsch's Webfoots, who will battle the Lewis and Clark Pioneers this afternoon at Portland, collected eight hits from the offerings of Beaver Hurler Don White, but they failed to stop the powerful OSC attack.

The Beaver horsehide-hammerers pounced upon Oregon's starting hurler, Jim Hanns, for eight hits and six earned runs in four innings. "The term, "earned runs," is used Joosely.

Beaver Right Fielder Bud Shirtclift hit a freak home run with one man aboard during the fourth in-ning. After Center Fielder Pete Goodbrod, first man up, drew a pass. Shirtclift powered a single to left field.
