Hawk emphasized the fact that the draft policy is only an executive order and that Congress may change it. He said that much criticism of the deferment plan is expected.

All college students were urged by Hawk to take the deferment test even if their grades now defer them. Passing the test would be a safeguard against any unexpected drop in GPA, Hawk suggested.

Students now deferred until the end of the present school year are eligible to take the test and will be allowed to remain in school if they pass the test.

Student Court Levies \$1 Fine

Receipts collected by the Student Court were increased by the sum of \$1 Wednesday evening in an uneventful session which saw but one individual appear before the group.

The \$1 fine was levied by the court for illegal parking in the area in front of John Straub Dormitory.

The court reviewed some 20 citations involving students who have failed to make an appearance before the court to settle their fines. These students will receive second notices requesting them to post bail with the Director of Men's Affairs or appear at the next session of the court.

Failure to appear in either place results in a doubling of the fine or eventual referral to the Office of Student Affairs, according to rules of the court.

The campus judicial group has a backlog of approximately 50 tickets issued during the last of winter term and over the spring holidays which will be handled during the next sessions of the court.

The Student Court will meet at 7:30 p.m. Apr. 18 in 315 SU.
