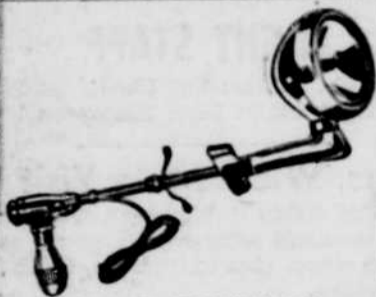

Oregon Diamondmen End With Half 'n' Half Record For Pre-season Games

The Oregon Ducks will open their 1951 Northern Division baseball season Wednesday against the Idaho Vandals on Howe Field.

Coach Don Kirsch's Webfoots seized their fifth victory in ten starts when they dropped the Portland Pilots 3-1 Saturday afternoon on Howe Field. They suffered a wild 11-8 defeat to the Willamette Bearcats on the previous afternoon at Salem.

The Portland clash was featured by the four-hit hurling of Oregon's Jack Pyle and Lyle Rogers. Pyle surrendered one run in seven innings, and Rogers held the Pilots scoreless during the final two frames, preserving his perfect 0.00 earned run average.

Portland gained a quick 1-0 lead in the first inning, but the Ducks knotted the count in the same frame when Joe Tom, who had three hits in four trips to the plate during the afternoon, collected a double and later scored when Second Baseman Daryle Nelson singled.

Tom, who participated in every successful Oregon scoring thrust, tripled in the seventh to score Third Sacker Nick Schmer with the final Duck run. Oregon routed Portland 13-3 during their earlier meeting.

Weakness in the pitcher's box contributed to Oregon's 11-8 loss to the Bearcats Friday afternoon. Webfoot Mel Krause issued free passes to eight batters, gave up eight runs, and tossed two home-

run pitches before he was relieved in the seventh by Jim Hanns.

The Ducks collected 10 hits from the offerings of Bearcat Hurler Mike Glenn, but five Oregon errors and the afore-mentioned pitching weakness provided too many scoring opportunities for the Salem nine.

Oregon's track squad, defending Northern Division champions, Saturday suffered an upset 57-74 loss to the University of Washington Huskies, at Seattle.

The Webfoots had a comfortable lead in points before running of the two-mile race, low hurdles and mile relay.

But hopes for winning honors against Washington, along with season hopes, suffered a sharp setback when Duck two-miler Backlund was forced to drop out of the race.

Duck Gridders End Scrimmage In 42-42 Tie

Two high geared Duck football machines matched each other score for score when the Whites and Greens romped through a 1½ hour game-type scrimmage to a 42-42 tie on Hayward Field Saturday.

Precision passing by White quarterback Hal Dunham, and three long touchdown gallops by freshman Ted Anderson of the Greens, were the highlights of the afternoon.

Dunham rifled two scoring passes to veteran end Monte Brethauer, and a third to Leroy Campbell, shifty transfer from Los Angeles City College.

Anderson Shows Heels

Anderson showed both blazing speed and shiftiness as he uncorked scoring runs of 20, 23, and 35 yards.

Backs Tom Novikoff, Cece Hodgca, Bunny Easter, and Ron Lyman provided the other White touchdowns.

Norm Fenton, Green quarterback, threw three passes for tallies. Two went to Campbell, and the third to Ken Sweitzer.

No Spring Grid Game

Bill Fell, another fleet halfback, raced 50 yards to complete Green scoring.

Coach Jim Aiken does not plan to hold his regular spring game this year because of the valuable time consumed in preparation for it.

Frosh Edge OCE 9-7 in Extra Innings

Coach Hal Zurcher's frosh baseball team produced two runs in the 12th inning to break a tie and win 9-7 over the Oregon College of Education Wolves in a Saturday tilt at Monmouth.

The Ducklings meet Oregon State's Rooks Friday at Eugene and the State Penitentiary team Saturday at Salem.

The winning OSC scores came in the top of the 12th on walks to Outfielder Marty Hankinson and Hurler Gene Lewis. Dick Stearns scored Hankinson with a sharp single, and Vince Tadei added another run-producing single.

Righthander Lewis stopped the Wolves in their final turn at bat to preserve the lead.

Fast baller Bill Bottler allowed three runs in his four-inning mound stint for the frosh.

Left Fielder Ron Phillips continued to wield a big bat for the Ducklings as he checked in with five for seven, including a double and a triple.

Portland Beavers Split With Solons

PORTLAND—(AP)—Sacramento took the seven-inning second game 8-1 today to split a Pacific Coast League doubleheader with the Portland Beavers. Portland won the opener 7-4 and remained atop the league.

The victory was the first the Senators have won in the eight times they have met the league-leading Beavers this season.

Backlund, setting the pace ahead by a good margin, was hobbled off the oval in the second lap when his Achilles tendon was almost completely loose from heel. Physicians at the University health service had surgery on Backlund early today.

Oregon Coach Bill Bowerman said of the meet that, while he was disappointed to lose, after the race seemed nearly certain, he nevertheless was proud of his team because of their individual performances.

A Duck surprise came in the 440- and 730-yard dashes when Jerry Mock came out on top both, in times of 10 seconds and 22 seconds, respectively. Runner-up in the 440 was Tom Turner, the Husky stadium were being windy in these events, which counted for the slow time.

A Webfoot sweep took place in the javelin event which Chuck Feldt, Earl Stelle, and Chas. grabbed all three places. Stelle tossed the spear 194 feet, 9 inches with the distance being reduced a cross-wind.

Other Oregon wins came in the 440-yard dash, where little Allier ran the circuit in 48.1 seconds and the mile run, where Fred Turner and Jack Hutchins took first and second. Turner ran in 4 minutes 27.4 seconds. Hutchins, Bowerman said, held back so that he could take the 880-yard race, in which he placed third.

Webfoot Walt McClure, fourth in the 880, finished second. Bill Edrson won the discus with a toss of 145 feet, 3 inches. Don McClure took the broad jump by leaping 16 feet, 6.5 inches.

Netters Win Twice But Lose to OSC

The Oregon tennis team, representing Willamette University and the Oregon Faculty All-Stars over the weekend, but things were different when the competition got tougher.

Oregon State College, however, won a 10-2 victory over the Ducks Saturday at Corvallis. This was between an 8-2 Oregon route of the Bearcats Friday and a 7-1 routing of the pros Sunday.

Ray Thornton of the Bears moved up to the number one spot for his first time and shocked Ducks Ace Tom Macdonald with a 6-4 triumph. This was Macdonald's first collegiate loss of the season.

In his two other weekend matches combined Macdonald lost two games less than he did against Thornton. He won 6-3, 6-3 over Willamette's top man and he beat L. McAllister, economics fellow, 6-1, 6-1.

Other faculty members to be in the variety were M. R. Greene, E. B. Bingham, A. W. Roecker, and E. C. Robbins. Greene and Cameron Thos, coach of the Oregon netters, were the only winners in the professional ranks. They defeated the top varsity twosome of Macdonald and Neil George by 6-3, 6-2.

Only Jerry Berreman managed to win a singles match over OSC and he was extended to 9-7, 7-5. Don Neraas and Merv England won the Ducks' final point in a fairly easy 6-1, 6-4 match.

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
