Kenton's 'Artistry in Rhythm' Feature of Governor's Dance

Stan Kenton will be playing strictly for dancing Saturday night when he brings his "Artistry in Rhythm" to Gill Coliseum at Oregon State College for the first annual Governor's Ball.

Governor's Ball tickets will be on sale at the University today and Friday in the Co-op. The price has been set at \$3.20 per couple, and the sales will be sponsored by the OSC and University chapters of Scabbard and Blade, national honor society for men in military organizations, and the OSC chapter of Pershing Rifles.

This will be Kenton's only appearance in the area this year.

Kenton became the center of a controversy when he took to the concert stage with his "Progressive Jazz" in 1947. In 1950, he featured a 40-piece concert orchestra and "Innovations in Modern Music." Kenton made 77 appearances throughout the United

States. The new Kenton orchestra played a successful engagement in Eugene last year and ended its sweep across the country in the Hollywood Bowl before an audience of 16,000.

Most of the old-standby Kenton musicians will be included in the 20-piece dance band which he will bring to Gill Coliseum.

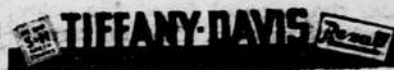

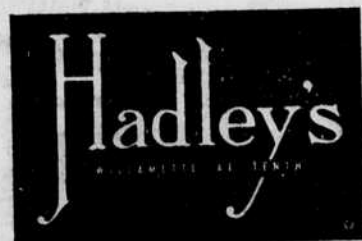
