KWAX's Frequency Modulation ROTC to Have Group Sponsor Is Advantageous But Unnoticed

is because KWAX is an FM-frequency modulation station.

It has become apparent since the opening broadcast of the University 10-watter that there are those on the campus and in the vicinity that aren't aware that this makes any particular difference. But it does, and here's why.

Two General Types

There are two types of radio broadcasting stations in general use today...AM and FM. AM means amplitude modulation and YWCA Sponsors is the most general type of radio. AM can be heard at a great distance from the station, but it often has static.

FM means frequency modulation. An FM station, such as KWAX, can be heard only on radios that have AM and FM receivers, or single FM radios. On most of the newer radio sets, a special band labeled FM will be found under the AM dial line. An FM band has numbers on the dial running between 88 and 108. To get KWAX, turn the selector switch to FM and then tune the dial to tour arranged by Simmons Stu-somewhere near 88. Tune above and below 88 until the loudest signal in that part of the dial is found.

Disadvantages, Too

The advantages are that FM never fades, there is little if any static due to weather conditions, and that FM stations never cut in on each other.

AM radios can be adjusted to pick up FM stations. In most cases, however, the process is more expensive than buying one of the cheaper FM and AM radios. The best bet would be to buy a purely FM radio.
