

Barclay, Loscutoff Suspended for Year

Aiken Names 3 Teams As Spring Drills End

With the close of spring football Saturday in a game-type scrimmage, Coach Jim Aiken named his tentative first, second, and third teams. He stated that at the present time the squad shaped up in the following manner, but that freshman eligibility for varsity competition next fall could cause changes in several positions.

First team: At left end is Monte Brethauer, pass-catching star of last years Duck eleven. Bill Bates, rugged transfer from East Mississippi JC holds down the left tackle slot, while Hal Simmons switches from tackle to left guard for his senior year. Center is capable Dick Patrick, while big Jerry Moshofsky is at right guard. Transfer Mike Sikorra holds forth at right tackle. At right end is Leroy Campbell, a Los Angeles City College transfer who should do big things in the pass-snagging department.

Smooth-passing Hal Dunham is at quarterback, holdovers Tom Edwards and Don Sloan at the halves, and transfer Tom Novikoff at fullback.

The Second outfit: Ken Sweitzer at left end, Len Diedreichs at left tackle, Emmett Williams at left guard, Howard Allman at center, Don McCauley at right guard, Jerry Shaw at right tackle, and Wayne Johnson at right end.

In the backfield are Barney Holland at quarterback, Ted Anderson

and Bill Fell at the halfback posts, and Ron Lyman at fullback.

The third team: Neil Tardio at left end, Bob Wilkins at left tackle, Del Clemens at left guard, Mike Popovitch at center, no one assigned to right guard, Bill Couch at right tackle, and Jerry Cach at right end.

The third team backfield includes Norm Fenton at quarter, Bunny Easter and Cecil Hodges at the halfback spots, and Ray Karnofski at fullback.

Golfers to Meet Vandals, WSC

The winners collected only five hits in the entire contest but they received 15 free passes to first base. Phi Delt hurler Bob Taggesell was the star of the day as he shackled the losers to 1 hit and smashed out a home run.

Beta Theta Pi encountered more difficulty in their episode with Campbell Club. After jumping to a 6-0 lead at the start of the fourth inning, Beta pitcher Harlan Mickey seemed to let up slightly and Campbell Club proceeded to spike the plate twice in the fourth and three more times in the fifth.

The winners regained control of the situation however, as they came through with five more runs during the remainder of the fray. Ken Ball led the Beta hitting parade with a pair of long triples.

He was very effective under the backboards, as he quickly demonstrated when he outclassed the Blue 'n Gold's Don Barkadale, who was voted America's outstanding amateur hooper in 1949. Loscutoff had more rebounds during his 20 minutes in that game than Barkadale took during the entire contest.

Loscutoff transferred from Grant Tech to Sacramento, where he was one of the top scorers in Northern California junior college competition. Loscutoff is a junior.

Barclay, a sophomore from Missoula, Montana, was outstanding in both basketball and baseball. He was fourth in Duckling scoring during his freshman year as he tallied 106 points for the once-bean Frosh.

He was a starter for Oregon's second-place ND quintet last winter, and he was placed on the All-Northern Division second squad.

Barclay, a forward, finished among the top ten scorers in the Northern Division. He is a business administration major.

Barclay also played on the Frosh and varsity baseball sides. His four-hit victory over the Oregon State Hooks last spring was one of the highlights of the 1950 Ducking season.

Barclay appeared twice this season for Coach Don Kirck's Duck varsity baseball squad. During his first performance, against the Abcher Blower and Pipe state semipro champions, he pitched three innings, surrendered three hits and gave up three runs.

He received a relief role Saturday afternoon and handuffed the Washington Huskies for two innings. Facing seven batters, he rendered only one hit.

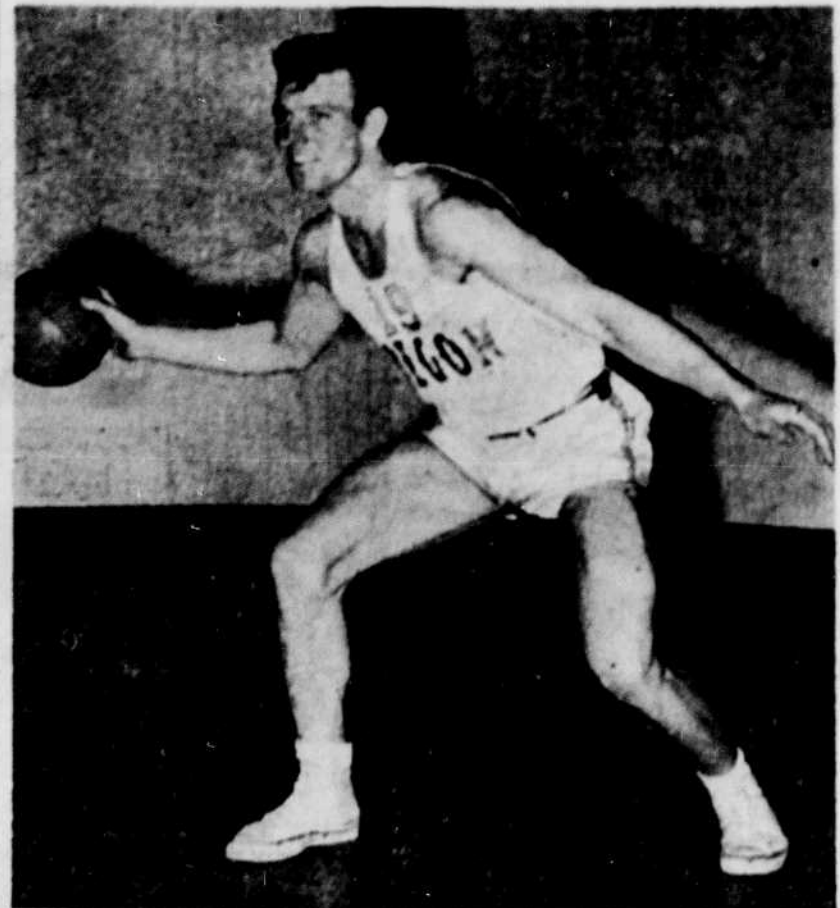

Indians Trade For Lou Brissie In 3-Way Swap

CLEVELAND—(AP)—The Cleveland Indians got Pitcher Lou Brissie from the Philadelphia Athletics today in a three-way trade which also involved the Chicago White Sox and six other players.

The trading sent Catcher Ray Murray and Pitcher Sam Zolak from the Indians, and Outfielders Dave Philley and Gus Zernial from the White Sox, to the A's. The Sox got infielder Orest esMino from the Tribe and Outfielder Paul Lehner from the A's roster.

General Manager Hank Greenberg of the Indians arranged the swapping by long distance telephone in an effort to get a left-handed pitcher.

Brissie, a 27-year old Purple Heart holder from World War II, won seven and lost 19 years last year for the A's.
