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Abbott Paine Gets Business Manager Post from Board

Lorna Larson will edit the 1951-52 Oregon Daily Emerald, and Abbott Paine will be the daily's business manager next year. They were named Thursday night by the Student Publications Board. Both will take over their new jobs next fall. Miss Larson, junior in journalism, is now managing editor of the Emerald. She has worked on the daily three years, holding staff positions all the way from night staff to managing editor. Last year she was news editor and assistant managing editor.

Paine is a sophomore in pre-journalism from Ontario, Calif. He is a zone salesman on the business staff this year, and has been a night editor and reporter.

Last year he was a part-time linotype operator at the University press, Springfield News, and Cottage Grove Sentinel. After graduating from high school, Paine worked on a weekly newspaper for a year.

Worked on Oregonian

Miss Larson's journalistic experience includes summer work on the Oregonian in Portland. Her home is in Portland.

In her three years at the University, she has been Kwama president, a member of Phi Theta Upsilon, junior women's honorary, Theta Sigma Phi, women's journalistic fraternity, the Student Union board, and the student discipline committee.

She has been associate editor and managing editor of Old Oregon, the alumni magazine.

Paine was the only applicant for the business managership. He succeeds Martel Scroggin. Tom King, senior in journalism, also applied for editorship, which is now held by Anita Holmes.

The board approved part of the Emerald budget for next year, and also determined the commission basis for the business side.

Peterson Backs Ousted Players

Bob Peterson, Oregon basketball player, said Thursday that athletes Jim Loscutoff and Curt Barclay did not receive a "square deal" in their suspension by the Student Discipline Committee.

Peterson, who urged a new hearing, said that Loscutoff and Barclay were advised by "a high administrative official" to agree to all charges so as to obtain leniency and were injured by the false testimony of a witness.

J. M. Foskett, chairman of the Student Discipline Committee, issued an official statement Thursday which said:

"The students had a fair and impartial hearing before a committee composed of students, faculty, and administration. The decision was unanimous."

Peterson stated that he did not think "that justice has been done," and that the case was "rushed through by the University." Loscutoff and Barclay did not have legal representation, Peterson said. He also said that the two men were informed of the charges against them in such a manner that they were unable to fully comprehend them. He had advised the two men to tell the discipline committee the truth.

Peterson said that tentative plans have been made to present

Benny Carter Signed For Saturday's Prom

Benny Carter, called America's most versatile bandleader, will be on the bandstand when Fathom Fantasy, the theme of the Junior Prom unfolds.

The well-known Mr. C is no stranger here to many upperclassmen. He appeared together with Dick Day's band at the 1948 Homecoming Dance, in McArthur Court. "Carter," reported the Emerald, "dished out both sweet and torrid to the throng on the floor."

"Fathom Fantasy," was selected by the Junior Prom committee, headed by Ann Darby, in accordance with the overall weekend theme, "Far Away Places." The time is 9 p.m. to midnight, Saturday, May 12, in the ballroom of the Student Union. Dress will be formal, with corsages optional.

Tickets Go On Sale

Skull and Dagger, sophomore men's service honorary, will sell tickets starting Monday in all men's living organizations. They will also be on sale in the Co-op. The price is \$2.60.

Nine hundred programs will be printed for the dance, which, according to decorations chairman Bonnie Birkemeier, will be complete with sunken ships and seaweed. Working with her as co-chairmen of decorations are Alice Morrow, Davida Riddell, Paul Lasker, and the entire Sigma Phi Epsilon pledge class.

Traditional events will be featured at the 10:30 intermission.

Ceremonies will be started with the introduction of the queen and her court, followed by the announcement of float parade winners, tapping of Druids, junior men's honorary, and presentation of awards.

These will include the Bert Brown Barker Scholarship cup, the Gerlinger Cup awarded to the outstanding junior woman, the Koyl Cup awarded the outstanding junior man, and the Maurice Harold Hunter Leadership plaque. The first number after intermission will be the Queen's Dance.

Benny Carter is truly a jack-of-all-trades in the music world. He has arranged for Benny Goodman, Jimmy and Tommy Dorsey, all three of whom retain "hints of the Carter style," and the British Broadcasting Company before the war. Carter and his band have made eight tours of the United States and three times have done the European circuit.

Played in Europe

The Benny Carter Band has appeared in several films, including "Stormy Weather" and most recently "As Thousands Cheer," playing a musical backdrop to Lena Horne. Carter is doubly appropriate for the weekend with its "Far Away Places" theme. Not only has he played in most of the big European and American cities, but he is also the master of five languages and a competent musician with four instruments...the clarinet, saxophone, trumpet, and piano.

Big event on the calendar is the annual Law School Ball, which will be held Saturday evening at the Student Union.

In connection with the big dance, New President Ed O'Reilly and Weekend Chairman Bill Taylor jointly announced the selection of the Fenton Filharmonic Music Depreciators as the official musical organization for the festival.

The selection was made after listening to several auditions during the week. "Unlike other organizations within this area, we were determined to come up with a name band that is really good," Taylor stated. O'Reilly chipped in with "We know they're good, for we heard 'em."
