#### **UO Wheels** Inter Class To Discuss Dorm Plan

The 1951-52 dormitory program and the recommendations of the ASUO dormitory committee which visited Stanford will be discussed by administration and committee members hind Kappa Sigma. sometime this week.

ASUO President Barry Mountain announced Tuesday that the committee will meet with Ray Hawk, director of men's affairs; Golda P. Wickham, director of women's affairs; H. P. Barnhart, dormitory foods director; and Donald DuShane, director of student affairs, to talk over the dormitory program.

The meeting will be prepared by a nine-student member committe following a visit to Stanford to investigate the living-in plan in effect on tha tcampus.

The suggested freshman living program has been approved by the Interfraternity Council, the Interhall Governing Board, and a representative group of the Interdormitory Council. IDC, however, has not yet approved the plan by Heads of Houses have rejected the

Panhellenic President Joanne Lewis said Tuesday that the sorority group does not disapprove of the entire plan, but objects to certain portions. She said that the rushing program outlined in the report was not favored by the group. She did not name any other objections.

The group voted against the entire plan, although approval of some parts was expressed. A committee to formulate definite suggestions to place before the dormitory committee was appointed by President Barbara Williams.

The IDC will meet Thursday night when a group vote on the plan is expected.
