'Art of Opera' Lecture Slated For Tonight

A lecture-demonstration on the "Art of the Opera" will be presented by Ernest Krenek, internationally known composer, at 8 p.m. today in the music school auditorium.

His most famous opera, "Johnny Strikes Up," has played successfully in all the major capitals of Europe and in the Metropolitan Opera House in New York. "Dark Waters," his newest opera, was premiered at the University of Southern California's Opera Workshop.

Krenek has also written seven books dealing with music. Among them is Music Here and Now.

The Austrian-born composer immigrated to the United States in 1938 because of the political crisis which was fast coming on in Austria. His views did not coincide with those of the Nazi regime. Since then, Krenek has become an American citizen.

He is now residing in Los Angeles. Krenek has given lectures at the University of Michigan, Vassar, and the University of Wisconsin. His talk on the University of Oregon campus will be illustrated with recordings from his own works.

Krenek's appearance is jointly sponsored by the University Lecture Series Committee and the School of Music, and it is a part of the regular lecture series.

His musical career started at the age of six, when he began to study piano and elementary music theory with private teachers. Krenek's early training was taken in Berlin and Vienna, the place of his birth.

"Ernst Krenek is one of the leading composers of our time. His operas, symphonies and chamber music are known internationally and are admired as being among the finest achievements of modern music," says Arnold Elston, associate professor of music at the University of Oregon.
