stated, "It goes back to the charter." He cited Oregon as a school at which faculty "sovereignty" is in evidence in the spirit of democracy.

"Responsible to Faculty"

Asked by a member of the council if a student could appeal a decision made by the Office of Student Affairs, Foskett said that no such review machinery was set up. He said that re-judging of a case decided by the office would constitute a violation of the principle of delegated authority. "The directors must act within the framework of committee policy," he added. Donald DuShane, director of student affairs, told the council that if there is any body superior to the discipline committee it would be the general faculty to which the committee is itself responsible.

Barry Mountain, ASUO president, asked Foskett's opinion of a plan contained within the Stanford Report which would call for the establishment of two student groups—men and women—to handle minor discipline cases and to work in conjunction with the present Student Discipline Committee and the Office of Student Affairs.

The two groups would be composed of a cross-section of students.

Foskett said that he would welcome any move on the part of student in the direction of assuming responsibility. He stated, however, that in the past some students had been guilty of shirking such responsibility. A tendency to shove the matter of academic cheating,
