

# Milligan's Golfers Finish Second in ND Tourney Behind Husky Linksman

The Oregon Golf team struck a snag in its drive for the Northern Division meet title on Seattle's hilly Inglewood Course Saturday.

Washington's Huskies, playing on their home course, topped Sid Milligan's Webfoots by a six stroke margin, 604 to 610. Oregon State came next with 612, followed by Washington State and Idaho, far back with 653 and 689.

There was one bright spot in the Oregon ranks, and that was sophomore Fred Strebel who pleasantly surprised Milligan by tying for medal honors with an even par 146 for 36 holes.

Also deadlocked for first were Paul Johanson and Don Russell of Washington. However Mueller actually shot the best golf of the day as he overcame a two stroke penalty given him during the morning round when his drive hit a golf bag on a comeback hole.

He carded a 77 in the morning including the penalty, but blazed back with a 69 round in the afternoon, the best of the day by two strokes.

Ron Clark, who had burned up the WSC course earlier this year, was cooler Saturday as he checked in with a 73-75 for a two over par 148. Bob Atkinson shot a 77-76 for a 153.

Oregon would have been breathing on the Huskies neck had not the usually consistent Fred Mueller proved unable to adjust to the strange course and shot a 80-83 for 163.

This was around eighteen strokes higher than Mueller's usual score, and had he been on, the story might have been different.

The weather Saturday was ideal, but the very hilly and long 73 par course, which none of the Oregon men but Clark had played on, served as the Waterloo for Webfoot championship hopes.

As it turned out the Webfoots duplicated their 1950 feat of winning the ND Dual Meet title and finishing second in the championship meet.

The Duck record up to Saturday was impressive, with a clean slate of 4-0 in Northern Division Dual Meet competition and non-conference victories over the University of British Columbia and the Eugene Country Club.

Coach Milligan announced that letter winners this year are the following men:

Dave Frey, Captain Ron Clark, Jim Hoogs, Fred Strebel, Fred Mueller, and Bob Atkinson. Frey is the only graduating senior, while Clark and Hoogs are juniors, and Strebel, Mueller and Atkinson are only sophomores.

Milligan said this contingent should give Oregon a strong team next season, and promising freshman Skip Nagler and Al Mundle may augment it further.

# Ducklings Drop Sixth Straight To OSC Rooks

The Oregon State Rooks made it six in a row over the Oregon Ducklings in baseball as they won a tight 4-2 contest on Howe Field Friday afternoon.

The Rooks nicked frosh right-hander Gene Lewis for 12 hits, one a second inning homer by Duane Helbig with no men on base.

Triples by Rooks Penrose and Holzgang accounted for another Rook run in the fourth, and they added their final pair in the seventh when the score was tied 2-2 as they combined three singles and a wild pitch to ice the game.

The frosh had tied the score in the sixth when they put together two of their five hits and two walks for two tallies.

Chuck Stolsig and Don Siegmund were the recipients of walks, and Dick Stearns and Ron Phillips hit the singles. Phillip's blow drove in both runs.

The lanky outfielder hit two singles during the contest to pace the meager frosh plate efforts.

Coach Hal Zurcher's frosh will meet the Rooks for the final pair of their eight game series this weekend.

Friday's tilt will be played at Corvallis, and Saturday's at Eugene.

# Beavers Rout Webfoots Oregons Error 6 Times As OSC Triumphs 16-2

The Oregon State Beavers routed the Oregon Duck baseball nine 16-2 Monday afternoon at Corvallis.

The victorious Aggies jumped from third place in the Northern Division standings to a first-place deadlock with the Washington Huskies. Each squad has eight wins and four setbacks with four games to play.

A Duck triumph would have placed Oregon only one game away from the league-leading Huskies.

# UofW Cops ND Loop Net Crown

The Northern Division tennis championship tourney was an all Oregon-Washington affair in the semi-finals. But it was the Washington Huskies that were still around at a ward time.

Second-seeded Tom Macdonald of Oregon battled to the finals but was ousted by Washington's top-seeded Wally Bostick. Bostick won 6-2, 6-2 to continue the Huskies' dominance of the net championship.

Macdonald eliminated two Huskies and an Oregon Stater in advancing to the final match. He bounced George Allison (OSC) 6-4, 6-2, Lou Wick (W) 4-6, 6-4, and Glenn Linden (W) 8-6, 6-1.

Both Webfoot doubles teams moved into the semi-final round. At that point Macdonald and Danny Cudahy lost 6-4, 6-4 to Bostick and Jerry Kirk and Neil George and Don Neraas were topped 6-2, 6-2 by Linden and Wick. The Huskies' second tandem, Linden and Wick, won the championship by upsetting the favored Bostick and Kirk 6-3, 15-13.

Don Neraas won his first round match 6-1, 6-4 over Idaho's Bob Gleason. Webfoot Dan Cudahy ran into Kirk of Washington in the opening round and lost 6-3, 8-6.

Two more Ducks were eliminated in the second round. Fifth-seeded Glenn Linden trounced Neraas 6-1, 6-2. Oregon Stater Jack Leach slapped Neil George 6-1, 6-1.

The Oregon tandems won three matches before the Huskies slowed them down. Zimmer and Neraas walloped Bob Zimmerman and Bob Gleason, Idaho, 6-2, 6-2, and beat Howard Brewer and Clarence Powell, Washington State, 6-4, 6-3. Macdonald and Cudahy topped George Allison and Don Megale, OSC, 3-6, 6-3, 6-4 to move into the semi-finals.

Oregon State's strong net squad had the misfortune of meeting the even-stronger Huskies in most quarter-final matches. Don Megale lost to Linden, Jack Leach lost to Bostick, and Ray Thornton lost to Kirk. A fourth Husky in these four matches was Wick who lost to Macdonald.

# Beta Theta Pi Wins IM Tennis Title Monday

By virtue of a 2 to 1 win over Nestor hall in the finals Beta Theta Pi captured the Intramural tennis crown Monday afternoon.

The Betas paced by the brilliant net play of Ken Ball triumphed in the two doubles matches while dropping the singles to the independents.

In the singles McCowen drubbed Beta Jim Bauer 6-2, 6-1. Top doubles action saw Ball and Max Vincent squeeze by Art Shepherd and Bob Thalhofer 6-4, 3-6, 6-3.

George McMath and Alan Mann outshot the Nestor second doubles team, Bob Holloway and Don Dewey, 8-6, 6-4.

Monica Gutchow won first place in the Women's singles Tennis tournament, beating out Mary Ann Rose, with the set scores of 6-2, and 6-1.

The Webfoot loss now leaves the Ducks in fourth place with a 7-7 win-loss record.

Washington State has a 9-5 record for a third-place ranking, and the last-place Idaho Vandals have no wins in 12 attempts.

Oregon State collected a total of 13 hits and took advantage of 6 Oregon errors to score 10 earned runs and 6 unearned counters.

Aune Starts Stan Aune pitched the opening six innings for the Webfoots, retiring after issuing 11 hits and 4 bases on balls. Reliever Lee Alvord lasted for one and two-thirds frames, surrendering one hit and two bases balls.

Jack Pyle relieved Alvord and accounted for the final one-third of an inning after walking four men and giving up one hit.

Beaver Hurler Don White surrendered nine hits, four walks, and two earned runs during his nine-inning tenure on the mound.

The Ducks jumped to a short-lived 1-0 lead in the first frame when Catcher Jack Smith drew a free pass with the bases loaded. The Beavers pushed ahead 4-1 in the second, added another run in the fourth, scored three in the sixth, added one in the seventh, and tallied seven in the eighth.

The final Oregon run was scored in the top of the seventh as Outfielder Dick Salter smashed a long triple and Shortstop Ray Coley singled to score Jim Livesay, who was running for Salter.

Oregon infielders accounted for all six errors. Coley led with two, and other miscues were provided by Second Baseman Daryle Nelson, who had replaced Phil Settecase in the starting lineup.

Settecase was injured during a pre-game batting practice. Aune suffered a back injury while on the mound, causing his removal from the contest.

Averill Gets Three Right Fielder Earl Averill, Jr., led the Ducks at the plate with three singles in five trips. Shortstop Gene Tanselli of OSC smashed a home run with one man on base.

Coach Don Kirsch's Ducks had earlier taken a one-sided 10-2 win over the Beavers Saturday at Eugene. Webfoot Moundsman Eugene Hanns limited the Aggies to one hit while his teammates collected 16 from three Stater pitchers.

Tom, Nelson, Hit Tom had three hits in five trips to the plate, Nelson had three for four, Settecase had two for four, and Livesay, Catcher Joe Sugura, and Averill collected one hit in two trips to the plate.

Tom stole three bases during the game, and Nelson stole two.

The Ducks will meet the Beavers Friday at Eugene and Saturday at Corvallis. The Saturday clash is the final game scheduled for Oregon this spring.
