

Ducks Face OSC In Weekend Tilt

The Oregon Duck baseball nine will battle the Oregon State Beavers Friday on Howe Field and Saturday at Corvallis.

The two games will be the final encounters of the season for the Webfoots, who are now in fourth place in the Northern Division with a 7-7 win-loss record.

The Beavers are deadlocked for first place in the conference standings, holding a record of eight wins and four setbacks. The two games with Oregon will complete the seasons schedule for the Aggies, who will not replay two rained-out games with the cellar-dwelling Idaho Vandals.

Huskies Meet Vandals
The Washington Huskies, present co-holders of first place in the N.D. standings, will face Idaho at Moscow Friday and Saturday and Washington State Monday and Tuesday at Pullman.

If Washington and OSC both remain undefeated during their remaining tilts, the title will go to the Huskies because they will have a 12-4 record, while the Beavers will have a 10-4 mark.

The Washington State Cougars also rate as strong contenders for the N.D. pennant and the right to meet the Southern California Trojans for the Pacific Coast Conference championship.

Cougars Might Win
The Cougars, who are seeking their fifth consecutive N. D. flag, hold a 9-5 conference record and could take first place by defeating Washington twice if Oregon takes at least one win from the Beavers. The Cougars suffered an 8-6 non-conference setback at the hands of

Eastern Washington College Monday afternoon at Cheney.

Friday's clash will be the fifth of the season between Oregon and OSC. The Beavers took two non-conference victories, dropping the Ducks 10-4 at Eugene and 18-8 at Corvallis.

In the two conference games, the old intra-state rivals split, Oregon taking an easy 10-2 victory last Saturday at Eugene and losing 16-2 Monday afternoon at Corvallis.

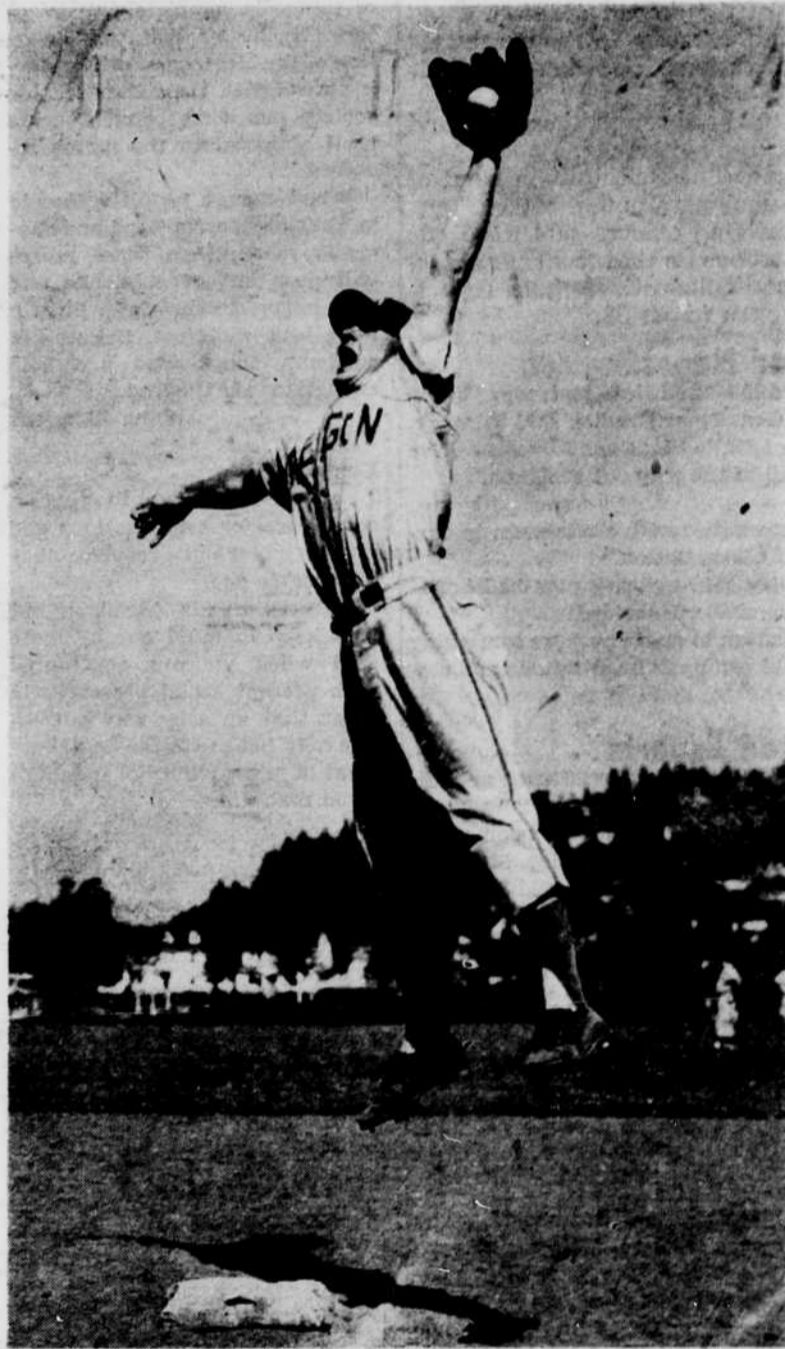
Oregon Leads
Oregon holds a 43-29 all-time series win-loss edge over the Beavers in N.D. competition. OSC has never taken four wins over the Ducks in one season, but Oregon stopped the Aggies with four straight victories in 1934 and again in 1937.

During the weekend games, the Webfoots will attempt to demonstrate the accuracy of the following statement appearing in the 1951 OSC Spring Sports Pressbook:

Moss Hits Homer, Red Sox Triumph

BOSTON—(P)—Les Moss' grand-slam homer with two out in the Red Sox a 6-3 victory over the Boston trot Tigers Tuesday.

The University of Oregon record for the two-mile run is 9:32.4, set by Pete Mundle as he won the Northern Division two-mile crown in 1950. Ace sophomore runner Fred Turner ran two miles in less than 9 minutes and 30 seconds in the 1951 N.D. Meet, but he placed second in the event.

Athletic Award Proposals Made For Webfoots

Recommendations have been made for the awarding of Oregon varsity letters to six golfers and four members of the Duck tennis squad, Athletic News Bureau Director Art Litchman announced Tuesday night.

Golf letters have been recommended for Ron Clark, Dave Frey, Fred Mueller, Fred Strelbel, Jim Hoogs, and Bob Atkinson. Clark and Frey won their first golf letters last spring.

Frey is the only graduating member of Coach Sid Milligan's 1951 Duck varsity which captured its third consecutive Northern Division dual meet crown and placed second in the annual N.D. Meet.

Tennis letters have been recommended for Tom MacDonald, Dan Cudahy, Neil George, and Don Neraas. MacDonald and Cudahy will be receiving their second varsity letters. Cudahy is the only graduating 1951 letterman. The Ducks placed second in the N.D. Meet.

St. Louis Rise Led by Jones

The comeback of Vernal (Nippy) Jones has injected new life into the St. Louis Cardinals.

The rise in the fortunes of the Cards dates from Jones' return to the varsity on May 15.

Jones, whose career appeared ended two years ago when he was floored with spinal injury, looked great in the spring but big Steve Bilko was awarded the first base job. Jones was shunted to the Cards' Rochester Farm in the International League.

Despite the demotion Jones didn't sulk. He banged the ball hard and often for the wings. Bilko didn't live up to expectations and Jones (Please turn to page five)
