Livingstone **Backs Arts**

(Continued from page three) superistition.

Dangerous Road

The road of imagination, Livingone warned, is also dangerous. He advocates a proper balance of the two. We must at times, he said, escape from the analytical mood. e must leave the world of thought to find the world of feeling.

Don't just teach a child to think, he said. In addition to giving him critical mind, teach him to see and feel. The best way to make a person critical, said Livingstone, is to show him the best, until everything else loses interest for

The way to reconcile the spirit of analysis and imagination, said Livingstone, is to develop a mind ensitive to values and aware of their variety. A poet should keep company with the rationalist, he added. In this way, he summed up, we would have the highest cult of educated men.

Our task now, he said, is to find those studies which will make the student feel rather than think. Poetry can correct the eye of the mind by developing capacities in it. This in turn, said Livingstone, can bring on an awareness of reality upon which reason can reflect and form a philosophy of life.

Poetry over Music Livingstone favors poetry over music for this purpose because it is more easily understood by most people, and because it is more directly related to the world.

The value of drama in education, he said, is that drama can be aborbed by the mind to mold hope, feeling, and personaility.

Livingstone brought a sympathetic chuckle from at least the student part of his audience when he said that examinations are the curse of education. He said that they may stimulate study, but they may also corrupt it.

Quoting freely from Ibsen, Wordsworth, and Ruskin, Living-stone used quotations to illustrate various points in his lecture. Several times he turned to Shakepeare to demonstrate how the analytical spirit can apply to the study of literature.

Instructors from the University took part in a conference on the new joint elementary teacher training plan held Saturday in Monmouth.




