Robinson Four Master Gives Dodgers Tie with NY Giants

Both games went down to the final out under dramatic circumstances.

The Braves had scored a run and had the tying run at second base and the winning run at first when Larry Jansen, the Giant hurler, bore down to get Willard Marshall for the final out.

Marshall, a former Giant who would rather beat his old teammates than eat, lifted an easy fly ball to Monte Irvin in left field to climax the greatest drive in baseball history—one which saw the Giants overcome a 13½ game lead which the Dodgers held on August 11.

When that game ended, it looked like the pennant for Leo Durocher's never-say-die Giants for the Dodgers were trailing the Phillies 8 to 5 at the time. The Dodgers had trailed 4-0 and 6-1 earlier in the game.

The Giants were on the train headed for home—they had waited in their Braves field clubhouse

until the final minute—when the Dodgers came from behind with three runs in the eighth to tie the score.

PITCHERS SELECTED

NEW YORK—(U.P.)—Two right handers, Jim Hearn and Ralph Branca, will pitch the opening game of the National League pennant playoff series at Ebbets Field today.

Hearn won 16 games for the Giants this season while losing nine. Branca won 13 for the Dodgers while losing 10.

The first of the best two out of three playoff series will begin at 1:30 p.m. EST. The second and third games, if the third is necessary, will be played at the Polo Grounds on Tuesday and Wednesday.

With two out in the top of the 14th, Robinson lined his home run into the upper left field bleachers and that turned out to be it but not until a last minute scare by the Phillies.

Richie Ashburn, who had been a thorn in the side of the Dodgers all day, led off with a single and was sacrificed to second by Willie Jones. But Ennis and Waitkus flied out and the Dodgers had tied the Giants for the pennant which a few innings earlier had seemed beyond their reach.

Second-half Rally Nets 39-21 Victory

Undaunted by a glaring 21-20 deficit at the intermission, the University of Oregon Webfoots rebounded in the second half for a resounding 39-21 victory over the University of Arizona Saturday afternoon on Hayward Field.

A middle-sized gathering of 12,549 watched under leaden skies as Len Casanova's hustlers won their first game since October 1, 1950, when the University of Montana Grizzlies fell victim to the Ducks, 21-13. The win snapped a losing string of eight.

The outcome was touch and go until the final seconds of the third period when George Shaw, Duck safety, intercepted Quarterback Ed Miller's pass on the Oregon 13. Shaw returned to the 45 to solidify a slim 26-21 advantage.

Within seconds, bulldozing Fullback Tom Novikoff, heading the ball carriers with a 99-yard net, hammered out a 12-yard gain which reclaimed all but three yards of a previous unnecessary roughness penalty. On the following play, Captain Tommy Edwards, left half pitched to Right End Dave Davenport, 18 year-old freshman from Portland's Grant High, on the 35. Davenport tight-roped the sideline boundary for the score. Novikoff's placement was partially blocked.

Reserves Tally

The Duck reserves further rattled the Arizona cause by tallying six minutes later, Fullback Cece Hodges hurdling the line for the touchdown. Harry Mondale converted. A 38 yard pass completion from Bill Fell to Davenport capped the 80-yard drive.

The winners took the second half kick off and relinquished possession of the pigskin only after the evasive Edwards had snaked his way four yards around end for the leading touchdown. Novikoff failed in a twenty-seventh point attempt; the Russian rambler, however, set off the charge with a 51 yard return of Dick Christiansen's boot.

The progress of the initial half had Oregon adherents wondering if they were in for a repetition of last weekend's encounter with the Indians at Portland.

After the Wildcats were forced to punt in the opening quarter, Casanova's crew covered 70 yards in 10 plays, culminated when the versatile Novikoff, on a pass-optional, elected to throw and connected with Davenport, 13 yards distant in the end zone. Novikoff missed his conversion try.

Aerial Possibilities

The Arizonans, showing great aerial possibilities, scored within four minutes, Miller locating Leo Brandt, left end, for an eleven-yarder. Jim Donarski broke the deadlock.

Don Sloan, junior halfback from Portland, raced 13 yards around left end for a second quarter Oregon touchdown, after the Arizona defense had retreated for a possible pass. Novikoff's kick was true, Oregon led 13-7.

LeRoy Campbell, Webfoot right end, gathered in a Hal Dunham 42 yard toss on the goal line and Novikoff again booted the extra point for a 20-7 margin.

The locals dissipated their edge in a hurry. Fred Martin grabbed a stray Dunham pass on the Oregon 42. Gil Gonzales, Dean McKown, and Don Beasley set up Ken Cardella for a two-yard ramble via left end for an Arizona score. Donarski converted with a minute, 42 seconds showing on the electric time piece.

Fumble Recovered

Martin again proved to be a Dunham nemesis, recovering his fumble on the Oregon 16. Cardella tried right end from one yard out for the tying score. No time remained as Donarski kicked the Ducks into the background.

Casanova heaped much praise on the Ducks' defensive platoon which held the Arizonans to a minus one yard net gained in the second half. Meriting special mention were Hal Reeve, John Reed, Earl Halt, and Shaw. His comment on Shaw's all-around defensive play: "Very fine."

The greying mentor was especially pleased with the offense, namely the line which "made some nice holes for our runners." The play of Dunham, Sloan, Edwards, Davenport, and Novikoff he dubbed encouraging.

Perhaps the real difference between this squad and last year's may be summed up in Casanova's statement to this effect: "The spirit they showed was very pleasing to me." This spirit according to Casanova, helps offset defensive lapses that can be cured by an eager, willing and youthful club that the Ducks have.

COPS Tough

Casanova warned, however, that the Webfoots will not be able to afford any such mistakes Saturday night in Stockton when the Oregonians meet Ernie Jorge's high scoring College of Pacific Bengals. Led by seatbacks Tom McCormack and Eddie Macon and passer Tony Geremia, who spent his freshman year under Jim Aiken at Oregon, the Tigers he labeled as one of the most under-estimated smaller colleges, year in and year out.

Dunham, his passing improved immeasurably, left nothing to be desired in his field generalship. He appeared to have the Wildcats completely baffled on his faking of backs into the line. That, and the optional pass plays on which Novikoff, Edwards, and Fell participated.
