 NSA activities on national and international affairs are concentrated at the annual national student congress. A typical problem discussed at the conference in August, according to Sandegren, was the question of forming a Western union of students from nations which had withdrawn from the International Union of Students (which other world student groups charge is Communist-dominated). Opponents of a new union felt it would create more conflict and prevent the non-IUS nations from accomplishing anything.

The best work at the congress was done in the subcommittee sessions, Sandegren felt. From there the discussions went to the commissions (on student life, educational problems, and international affairs), and then to the plenary session, where votes were finally taken. Sandegren said that when the fruits of the congress are taken back to the colleges, the students can benefit in their thinking and activity on these issues.

Any changes after this date will involve penalties and petitions for exception, Registrar Clifford L. Constance, said.

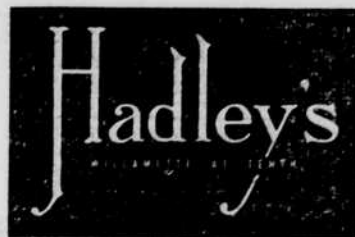
