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Leeper Outlines Honor Work For Upper Division Students

er, professor of psychology and chairman of the honors council.

One of the problems of a large university, according to Leeper, is that of giving a sufficiently individualized program of study to students of unusual ability.

It is financially difficult for the university to give careful individual supervision to the work of all students, Leeper said, but the university does feel that it is especially important to provide special opportunities for students who are showing themselves capable of unusually fine academic work

Program in Operation

There is an honors program currently in operation which was instigated in the University program in 1927. The present honors work is open to upper-division students who have at least a 2.75 GPA from their lower-division work and who can maintain at least a GPA of 3.00 in each term of their upper division work.

Students who meet these requirements may register in 305 or 405 courses in "Reading and Conference," 301 or 401 courses in Monday. "Research," and 403 courses in "Thesis." The work culminates in the writing of a thesis which is a lesser version of the thesis submitted by graduate students for the

master's degree and in an oral examination at the end of the senior year. A major extension of honors

work for the freshman and sophomore years was approved in principle by the liberal arts faculty last year. Six students, four in English and two in architecture, were availed of the program last year.

Several faculty committees are now engaged in defining the objectives and planning the curricula of five special honors courses which will be open, possibly next

Oregon's 'Y' Booklet **Gains National Notice**

The University of Oregon's YM-CA has gained national notice with the publication of a booklet called "Welcome to Oregon-a handbook for foreign students", according to Jack Merner, executive secretary of the group.

The booklet, which was sent to foreign students by the University or the Institute of International Education, contains such facts as where the University of Oregon is located and what its purpose is. The handbook also tells the student what to wear, how to behave and what students do for recreation. Tony McCarroll acted as editor of the publication which was written by foreign students who had been at the University for at least a year.
