U.N. Troops Fight to Valley Gates;
Reds Agree to Change Truce Site

United Nations troops Sunday blasted their way to the gates of the Mundung valley, strategic Red build-up area on the eastern front, and 8th Army commander Gen. James A. Van Fleet promised they will keep going until the Reds have "had enough of it."

The thunderous, methodical autumn offensive achieved its greatest success on the flaming east front where U.S. and French infantrymen battled their way to the top of "Kim Il Sung" peak against furious Chinese Red resistance.

The mountain height, named in honor of the North Korean Communist commander, is a North Korean landmark. It commands the vital Mundung river valley which the Reds have used as an east front staging area.

Meanwhile, a grudging Communist . . .

... agreement to his demand that the stalemated Korean truce talks be moved from Red-held and incident-ridden Kaesong was received by Gen. Matthew B. Ridgway, Sunday.

The Reds proposed the village of Pan Mun Jom—still in the fringes of their lines—rather than the no-man's-land town of Songhyon which Ridgway had urged. The Communists also demanded an enlargement of the "neutral zone" to include Munsan, the United Nations advance "peace" camp.

These two items of the Communist proposal were expected to make their reply unacceptable to Ridgway.

In San Francisco, a nationwide . . .

... shipping tieup appeared imminent today as CIO radio operators flatly refused to sign for new cruises until the wage stabilization board "quits stalling" and approves their recently-won wage raise.

Philip O'Rourke, national vice-president of the CIO American Radio Association, said Sunday he just "couldn't find" any of his men willing to man ships until the wage increase comes through from the federal agency. He said the action was "definitely not a strike."

Princess Elizabeth and Prince Philip took off . . .

... from London early Monday on a flight to Canada, while Queen Elizabeth stood by the runway blowing kisses. The London airport was ablaze with lights and hundreds of people were on hand despite the lateness of the hour, to cheer as the huge American-made liner left the ground.

In Canada, citizens were preparing for a giant five-week party to begin at noon Tuesday. They are "shooting the works" to make everything perfect for the celebrities on their 10,000 mile royal tour of the nation.

Another crack at Senator McCarthy came . . .

... Sunday when Senator William Benton, (D-Conn.) said that the Wisconsin senator is a "Joseph-come-lately" in the drive to rid the government payroll of Communists, and has sold the public a bill of goods.

Renewing his running attack on McCarthy, Benton said the Wisconsin senator "with his great skill as a propagandist has somehow managed to create the illusion this it was he who was responsible for the effort to rid the government of Communists."

McCarthy, who has characterized Benton as the "mental midget from Connecticut," was not immediately available for comment.

'Dozens' of new Atomic weapons . . .

... including "artillery shells, guided missiles, torpedoes, rockets and bombs for ground support aircraft" are being readied for possible use, chairman Gordon Dean of the Atomic Energy Commission, disclosed Sunday.

He indicated that some of them already are in production and said others will be available to the armed forces next year.

A new one-way traffic grid system . . .

... for Salem goes into effect Monday.

Under the new system, most of the northbound traffic moves on Liberty and No. Capital Sts., with the southbound traffic routed on No. Summer and Commercial Sts. The new grid system was worked out by the Oregon State highway department.

Sister Elizabeth Kenny says she is . . .

... flying home to her native Australia Monday "in triumph" because medical scientists have been forced to accept the infantile paralysis theories she discovered 42 years ago.

Sister Kenny, herself suffering from incurable Parkinson's disease which has already caused a slight paralysis of her right arm and leg, thinks she is leaving the United States for the last time.

Fifty-five Republican House members . . .

... will urge the Senate Monday to reject the nomination of Ambassador Philip C. Jessup as delegate to the United Nations general assembly because he does not have the full support of the nation.

The Congressmen, who have no legal say on confirmation matters, addressed their views to the foreign relations subcommittee, which will consider Jessup's nomination.

"The most important question, as we see it, is not Mr. Jessup's faith in America, but America's faith in Mr. Jessup," the Congressmen said.

2,606 Students
Get Chest X-rays

More than one-half of University students, 2,606, took advantage of the free chest x-ray service offered last week on campus.

"I wish to express my thanks to all the students who helped in the campus x-ray project. The co-operation was wonderful," Mrs. W. J. Manuelson, x-ray technician, said, at the close of the campaign Friday.
