(Continued from page one) and cooperation is needed," Mehta stated.

Paul B. Means, head of the department of religion and recently returned from an 18 months trip in southeast Asia, called the assassination part of the opposition of fanatical religious groups against the cooperative and compromise policies of the western democracies.

Means suggested that previous incidents in Iran and Egypt indicate the spread of religious dislike to compromise of the type practiced by Liaquat.

"The assassination will complicate the solution of the Kashmir problem," Means said. "Liaquat acted as a moderating and constructive influence. The incident may tend to embitter the situation."

The relationship between India and Pakistan will not be decided by the common people, Means stated, but by fanatical groups who draw their code of honor from their religion. Extreme elements in both governments will make agreement difficult, he said.

The suggestion was also made that the group continue as a club in which the pledge-class representatives could get together and discuss issues common to all houses to reach house's personal benefit.

The JIFC is hampered in its right to gain recognition on the campus by the fact that in the past the council has done practically nothing and has shown no purpose or existing, Walker stated. Judge Elderkin advanced the theory that the council should not exist as a service organization, of which here are already enough, but as an organization to further the interests and work for the betterment of the fraternity system.

The junior council decided to send a committee of four to meet with the Inter-Fraternity council to discuss with that group what the JIFC thinks the purpose of the junior Inter-Fraternity Council should be. The committee is composed of Bill Walker, Sigma Phi Epsilon; Judge Elderkin, Theta Chi; Duane Stoddard, Phi Kappa Sigma; and Craig Weatherford, Phi Kappa Psi.

Walker also made the suggestion that each pledge representative talk with his house president and find out if he had any suggestions about what the JIFC could do.

At the next meeting, October 20, the council will meet with a representative from the Office of Student Affairs one one from the Inter-Fraternity council.

Miss Edna Dunberg died July 21, 1936, five months after the work was completed, without ever seeing the faces she had worked so hard to complete.

### Famous Men of Knowledge

Aristotle, a Greek philosopher whose ideas are still widely taught; St. Thomas Aquinas, religious philosopher and writer; John Locke, English philosopher; Thucydides, Athenian historian; Buddha, Indian philosopher and founder of Buddhism.

Christ; Michelangelo, the Italian painter and sculptor; Beethoven, Prussian composer; Leonardo Da Vinci, Italian painter and sculptor; Sir Isaac Newton, English philosopher and mathematician; Darwin, English naturalist; Jefferson, third president of U.S.; Oliver Wendell Holmes, orator and associate justice of Supreme Court; Shakespeare, English poet and dramatist; Dante, Italian poet.
