Paul B. Means, head of the de partment of religion and recently returned from an 18 months trig in southeast Asia, called the assas sination part of the opposition o fanatical religious groups agains' the cooperative and compromise policies of the western democra

Means suggested that previous incidents in Iran and Egypt indicate the spread of religious dislike to compromise of the type practiced by Liaquat.

"The assassination will compli cate the solution of the Kashmi problem," Means said. "Liaqual acted as a moderating and constructive influence. The incident may tend to embitter the situa

The relationship between India and Pakistan will not be decided by the common people, Mean stated, but by fanatical group who draw their code of honor from their religion. Extreme element in both governments will make agreement difficult, he said.
