World News Capsules U.N. Planes Hit Enemy Railroads; Panmunjom Truce Talks Continue

Allied planes have made of the most concentrated attacks of the war on Communist rail lines and trains in North Korea. Fighter bombers caught the Red trains out in the open and destroyed 9 locomotives and 99 rail cars before the Reds could run for cover. Nineteen locomotives and 129 cars were listed as damaged.

Comparative quiet has fallen all along most of the fighting front with the resumption of truce negotiations in Pan munjom. But there was a brief but sharp encounter southeast of Kumsong on the central front, where U.N. infantry drove Red forces from a hill position.

At the truce table in Panmunjom . . .

... United Nations truce negotiators offered Thursday to give up 200 square miles of hard-won territory in eastern Korea if the Reds yield an equal amount of terrain in the west.

U.N. officers made the offer in proposing a 2½-mile-wide armistice buffer zone across Korea at a subcommittee meeting following the reopening of cease-fire talks with the Communists in Panmunjom.

The Communists were expected to give their answer at another meeting today.

President Truman said Thursday

 \dots that the nomination of an ambassador to the Vatican in no way conflicts with the basic American doctrine of separation of church and state.

Mr. Truman told a news conference he was aware of all kinds of criticism of his nomination of Gen. Mark W. Clark to be this country's first ambassador to the Holy city.

But he said it was necessary to go ahead and thrash out differences over the appointment which, he said, was made in an effort to further the cause of world peace.

The Egyptians claim that the British have killed

... one and wounded another of their men in a new outbreak of violence in the Suez canal zone.

Egyptian interior minister Faud Serag El-Din Pasha said the incident occurred Wednesday about 10 miles from Port Said. He said British troops in a car opened fire on an Egyptian truck. 13th and Pearl. The talk will be preceded by a thirty-five cent supper which will begin at 5:30 p.m.

'Progress' in American-Iranian talks . . .

...would be reported to Britain to determine whether the stalled oil negotiations might be resumed at an early date, one diplomatic source said Thursday.

Official U.S. sources said this government was optomistic that British and Iranians could be brought together again following Britain's elections. They hoped a decision could be reached before Iranian Premier Mohammed Mossadegh leaves Washington in the next fcw days.


Secretary of State Dean Acheson left for Paris . . .



AFL stevedors hooted down a union proposal . . .

... Thursday to end an 11-day wildcat waterfront strike that has almost closed the nation's largest port and piled up \$250,000,000 worth of cargo at New York.

The striking 20,000 members of the International Longshoremen's Association jeered at union president Joseph P. Ryan's suggestion that they return to work while a federal board studied their grievances.

Customs officials reported 144 ships were idle at 138 piers in New York, Brooklyn, Staten Island, New Jersey and Albany, N.Y.

Communists barred West Berlin police ...

... Thursday from traveling across 300 yards of the Soviet zone to reach the American sector outpost of Steinstuecken.

The Red action cast doubt upon the validity of the Soviet promise to return the disputed "island" sector to U.S. jurisdiction. The Communist police said they were under orders to prevent "illegal" trips through the Soviet zone.

Steinstuecken is cut off from the American sector by a narrow strip of the Soviet zone but the Red Wednesday permitted three West Berlin police to go into the area.

The cost of living has gone up again . . .

... to hit a new all-time high—and that will mean a small pay increase for more than 100,000 workers. Their contracts are tied to the government cost-of-living index.

Clothing was the big item in pushing the index to a new record high, although food prices also edged up a bit.

The latest reading is for the month ending Sept. 15. The index showed a gain of nearly 7 per cent compared to September one year ago.
