

ATO Downs Betas; Sigma Nu Tips Fijis

In Monday's intramural volleyball "B" action, ATO downed Beta Theta Pi, 2-0; Tau Kappa Epsilon swept its pair of tilts with Chi Psi; Sigma Nu outlasted Phi Gamma Delta, 2-1 in a close match; the Pi Kappas won 2-0 over Delta Tau Delta; and Lambda Chi Alpha was a 2-0 victor over Sigma Phi Epsilon.

The ATO-Beta tilt was a thriller, with the Taus taking the first game 16-14 after the score was tied 14-all. In the next game, the ATO aggregation had an easier time of it, walking off with a 15-10 win to clinch the match. Ron Lowell was the guiding light for the winners with outstanding play at the net.

In the TKE-Chi Psi contest, the Tekes had little trouble as they swept the match in two straight tilts, 15-6 and 15-9.

The Sigma Nus started slowly in their match with the Fijis, and lost the first game 15-5. But in the next one they almost reversed the count to come out ahead 15-6. The decisive contest was a little closer, but the Sigma Nu squad pulled through to a 15-12 triumph.

Season's Toughest Scrimmage Staged On Regulation Turf

A handful of sideline observers blinked their eyes in disbelief as the University of Oregon football squad underwent an earth-shaking scrimmage Monday afternoon on the Freshman practice turf.

Undoubtedly expecting any of the many University of California defensive platoons to be well educated on the fundamentals of blocking and tackling, Len Casanova turned his offensive unit loose against the defensive aggregation and the end result was the most rugged scrimmage of the year.

Coming on the heels of a cross-country flight from Boston, the Ducks first surprised by making their first appearance of the year on the regulation sized fresh gridiron; the scrimmage was the first in over two weeks, as the Webfoots failed to sustain more than a few bruises against the Terriers last weekend.

Webfoot stock for the Nov. 17 meeting with the Bears in Cal's Memorial Stadium rocketed when Fullback Tom Novikoff, reportedly laid up for the entire season with a back injury, took part in the melee. It is reported by Trainer Bob Officer that Novikoff may see action against the Bears.

Oregon End Dick Davenport, also slated to be withheld from the lineup for the duration of the schedule, suited up, but confined his activity to limbering exercises. Tackle Len Diedericks was also in uniform. Officer expressed doubt concerning the chances of either being used against Oregon State college Nov. 24.

Dunham, Shaw Alternate
 Quarterbacks Hal Dunham and George Shaw alternated in directing the offense against the varsity's defensive unit. Casanova, Johnny McKay and Bill Bowerman supervised the attack while Gene Harlow and Jack Roche aided the defenders.

The high-spirited scrimmage, which caused a few tempers to rise, was a virtual standoff from the point of efficiency. Except for a couple of breakaway runs by Cecil Hodges, Ted Anderson and Tommy Edwards, the defensive forward wall held the backs completely in check.

Meanwhile, Shaw and Dunham were completing over 75 per cent of their aerials to ends Hal Reeve, Monte Brethauer, LeRoy Campbell and Ken Sweitzer.

Hopes of a Cal upset over Stanford in the "Big Game" at Palo Alto were dealt a wicked blow when Fullback Johnny Olszewski reinjured his knee, originally hurt against Southern California. UC Team Physician D. James T. Harkness said that "Johnny O" definitely will not see action against the Webfoots Saturday.

Statistics released Monday by the University of Oregon Athletic News Bureau show Novikoff as the leader in the rushing department with a net yardage of 243. His closest rival is Tommy Edwards, 237; third in line is Don Sloan, 187.

Passing Statistics
 Dunham continues to show a sizable lead in passing over Shaw; the junior passer has completed 54 of 128 throws for 606 yards while the freshman has tossed for 359, throwing 76 times and completing 32.

Anderson heads the scoring list with 18 points tallied; he is trailed by Novikoff, 16, and Davenport, Edwards and Sloan, each with 12. Top pass catcher is Davenport, 273, followed by Edwards, 162, and Brethauer, 140.

Shaw shattered a Pacific Coast Conference (all games) record for passes intercepted in one season at Boston when he previewed his 11th. He broke the previous mark of 10 set in 1947 by Jake Leight.

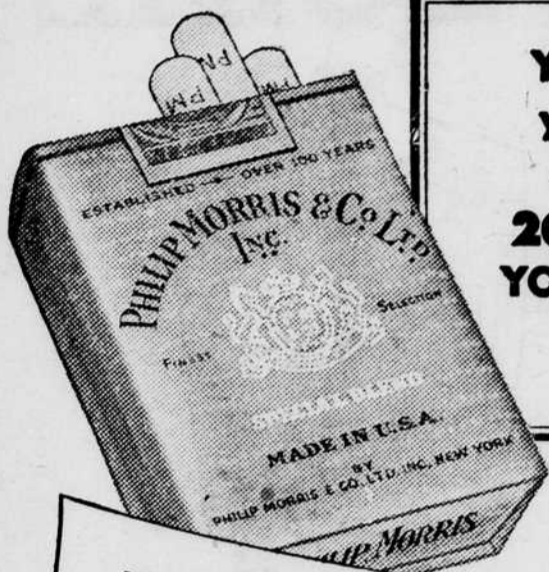
